Message from the President

Our year got off to a good start in January. The panel presented us with many possibilities for service in our community that we had not necessarily considered. In February, we will focus on the community of women and girls. Our speaker, Eileen Baratuci, will present "Women in the Work Place" covering topics like the pay gap, the glass ceiling, family and career, the Equal Rights Amendment and Lily Ledbetter Fair Pay Act, challenges for women in high-tech and women in leadership. These are timely topics that our entire community can benefit. Eileen is a lawyer whose practice has centered on labor and employment law. She has served as an investigator for all City of Seattle Departments as well as an Equal Employment Opportunity Commission mediator and neutral arbitrator for over 25 years. Eileen is an active member of the Port Townsend branch of AAUW and served as Vice-President of Programs. She continues to practice law in Port Townsend conducting training programs, workplace investigations and working on various labor and employment matters. We are more than honored to have her come to our community to address topics that touch the hearts and minds of every woman and every man who upholds the concept of equality in the workplace. Please invite your friends and neighbors to join us on Saturday, February 18 at 10:00 a.m. in the Camano Island Library Community Meeting Room for Eileen's presentation.

I also need to update you on news from national: there are two opportunities to vote coming up soon. The first is a personal one since I have submitted two paintings to the 2017 AAUW Art Contest. Please go to aauw.org, click on the banner picture with the artist's brushes and then go to "Visit the art contest gallery." There you can see all the entrants and hopefully vote for one or both of mine. The voting period runs from February 6-28. The second and more important item that requires your vote is the AAUW National Election. Candidates will stand for election to the 2017-19 AAUW Board of Directors. The slate of candidates is already listed on the site, and candidate bios and videos will be available online as of January 30. The election timeline is as follows: early April 2017, voter PINs e-mailed to members and mailed with the Spring AAUW Outlook which will contain the slate, bylaws, public policy proposals and resolutions; April 3, 2017, opening date to request paper ballot; April 14, 2017, voting begins online; May 22, 2017, deadline for mailing paper ballot; June 15, 2017, online voting ends at 9:00 p.m. EDT; June 16, 2017, election results announced online and at convention. Aside from the candidates, there will also be a by-laws amendment to consider. This amendment concerns removing the degree requirement for AAUW membership eligibility. Without your vote your viewpoint can't be heard.

Lastly, February is the month dedicated to love. Let's all focus on the friendships that we've made through AAUW and remember that cultivating deep friendships brings its own rewards. Let's all look to our friends and support one another through the good times and the bad. Sisterhood is a journey undertaken together. It's our foundation.

The AAUW Connection: *Purses with Purpose* and STEM *Jackie DeFazio*

In writing this, I am wearing two hats—that of the person who provides information on AAUW Funds and the Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) and that of co-chair of *Purses with Purpose 2017*, the funding source for this branch's Teck Trek Stem Scholars, our local scholarship donations, and our contributions to AAUW Funds and LAF. Helping members of our community understand the purpose of our fundraising efforts is essential to their success. Towards that end, here are some interesting findings on the impact of Tech Trek STEM camps for girls.

Tech Trek actually began in 1998 in California as an experimental summer camp designed to pique the interest of rising eighth-grade girls in science, technology, engineering, and math. In 2013 a survey of California Tech Trek alumnae provided the following information:

- A majority of alumnae surveyed believed that Tech Trek increased their interest in science (94%), technology (77%), mathematics (70%), engineering (52%), and computer programming (44%).
- 91% reported that Tech Trek boosted their self-confidence in their ability to be successful in science classes, and 78% said the same for math classes.
- 82% reported that they chose to take more science classes in high school because of Tech Trek.
- 87% of those surveyed had completed Algebra 2 compared with 78% of female students and 73% of male students nationally.
- 87% said Tech Trek introduced them to new STEM careers.
- 73% said Tech Trek introduced them to STEM college majors of which they were previously unaware.

So, as you begin to talk to folks about attending *Purses with Purpose 2017,* be sure to let them know the lasting impact they can have on the lives of young women in our community by doing so.

The meeting, which was open to the public, was held at the Camano Island Library, and called to order at 10:08 a.m. by President Norma Mouton.

Norma introduced Kathy Cunningham, Program Co-Vice President, who introduced our three guest speakers: Karla Jacks, Director, Camano Center; Lynn Ayers from the Stanwood-Camano Foodbank and Christie Connors from the Stanwood-Camano Community Resource Center. The three woman gave in-depth overviews of the services each organization provides to our community, as well as the ongoing collaboration between the three.

The general business meeting was called to order at 11:35 a.m. by President Norma Mouton.

Anne Milton provided an update on scholarships. We need two more committee members to bring the total to five members. Elaine Richards and Terry Benson volunteered. The drop dead date for applications is May 30; application submissions will open mid to late Christie Connors, Karla Jacks, Lynn Ayers February.



Leslie Gitomer reported she is getting teacher nominations for Tech Trek now to be followed by student applications and essays. Interviews will begin mid to late February.

Jackie DeFazio updated the group on PWP. We need at least 60 new purses-please leave the tags on them; procurement of all purses needs to be complete by June 1. A "Save the Date" email will be sent in April; ticket sales will open in May. We want to sell as many whole tables of six or eight as possible.

The scholarship budget was reviewed and approved.

Kathy Cunningham and Nancy Roberts asked for two volunteers to assist them with programs to cover their positions when they are traveling.

India Nishi introduced the strategic planning process and passed out the first of four questionnaires we will complete over the following three months. The group broke out into small groups to provide feedback.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:00 p.m.
