Shattering the Glass Ceiling

In 2017, more than 5 percent of Fortune 500 CEOs will be women, a record high number, according to AAUW's website. Despite this progress, there are only 27 women CEOs in the entire country, indicating how much more work needs to be done. To combat this gender leadership gap, AAUW has awarded 11 campus teams Campus Action Project (CAP) grants to put AAUW's research into action.

Inspired by AAUW's research report, *Barriers and Bias: The Status of Women in Leadership*, students, faculty, and staff will confront stereotypes and bias in their communities this spring. The 2017 CAP teams represent the spectrum of higher education institutions — the Ivy League, public universities, community colleges, historically black and tribal universities, and the first international school to receive the grant. Some winners and their projects include:

- The University of the District of Columbia has designed a peer mentoring program to promote leadership skills among college women to address the unique challenges faced by a diverse campus.
- Navaho Technical University will address the gender stereotypes Navaho women experience through a speaker series featuring distinguished Navajo women leaders discussing their life stories. The aim is to inspire students, staff, and faculty across NTU to find innovative ways to break through barriers to leadership.
- Cornell University's CAP team aims to empower undergraduate and graduate women to be agents of change and lead the movement for greater inclusion in the sciences. The team will build solidarity among college women scientists and equip them with tools to promote greater gender and racial inclusivity within the STEM fields.
- At the University of Dar es salaam, where females lag behind in many forms of faculty, administrative, and student participation, the team will use their CAP grant to increase the number of women in their student government by addressing negative stereotypes on campus, and demanding effective policy reform for greater equity across the social, political, and economic realms.

Just a reminder of the amazing things AAUW members help to accomplish when we contribute to AAUW Funds at the national level, something we do through branch and individual contributions.

I recently met a young woman wearing a T-shirt that said, "We can't all get ahead if half of us are held back."

The Washington State House of Representatives took a step this week to remedy women being held back in earning the same wages as men for equal work. The House passed a measure that seeks to provide working women with equal pay, growth opportunities and fair treatment in the workplace. The bill passed 61-36 in the House and its fate may have been decided in the Senate by the time you read this newsletter.

This effort to update the 70 - year-old equal pay act has been supported by AAUW members throughout the state and reflects the work of our national AAUW colleagues in this area.

If you are concerned about this and other issues affecting women, let your legislators know why you want changes and tell them you support them when they work for changes that positively affect women and girls. When we join together, our many small voices become one strong message for fair treatment for women.



General Meeting Minutes- March 9, 2017

The meeting was called to order at 2:00 p.m. by President Norma Mouton. Guests and new members were introduced. Norma introduced Judith Prince, Washington State AAUW President, who encouraged all to attend the April 22, 2017 one day Annual Meeting at the North Bend Cedar River Educational Center. Judith also asked for candidates for three open State Board positions, and said all information will be in the upcoming Evergreen Leader newsletter.

Norma then introduced Kathy Cunningham, VP Programs, who introduced the guest panel on Human Trafficking, brought to us by member Lynda Buehring. The panel included Jennifer Williams, HSI Special Agent, SPD Detective Megan Bruneau, and HSI Victim Assistant Specialist Clint Watanabe. They spoke on sex and labor trafficking, child exploitation, forced fraud coercion, and domestic servitude; they stressed the need for community involvement and encouraged us all, "If you see something, say something".

Following the panel and a question-and-answer period, Norma called the business portion of the meeting to order at 3:30 p.m. The February General Meeting Minutes were approved.

Jackie Defazio gave an update on PWP including the Board approval of an expenditure of \$850 to submit to the IRS for a 501(c)3 status. She asked that all purses be submitted by members by June, 2017.

Anne Milton gave an update on Scholarships and Tech Trek. Twelve candidates were interviewed for Tech Trek; we will send four, possibly five, this summer. University scholarship applications are open and on the WashBoard.org website. An email will be sent to members with information and application forms, for members to share with the community as well. The close date is May 15, 2017.

Martha Huyler advised that annual dues of \$83 are due by July 1 and requested members submit by June 1; members who join on or after March 16 pay only the new year's dues.

India Nishi reviewed the status of our Strategic Plan development and members broke into small groups to complete a short questionnaire.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:10 p.m.
