Newest Research Provides More Purpose to Our Search for Purses Jackie DeFazio

On May 24, AAUW released its newest research report, *Deeper in Debt: Women and Student Loans,* revealing that women hold almost two-thirds (\$833 billion) of the country's \$1.3-trillion student debt. The research shows that those with the scarcest resources bear the brunt of student debt in the U.S.


"Because of factors like the gender pay gap, debt that could be manageable ends up becoming unmanageable, particularly for women," according to Kevin Miller, Ph.D., the senior researcher for AAUW. More than half of graduating U.S. college students have financed some or all of their education with student loans. Women now earn 57% of bachelor's degrees in the U.S., and AAUW estimates that they take an average of two years longer to pay off their student debt than men do. Black women take on more student debt than do members of any other group and struggle the most to pay it off.

Says Anne Hedgepath, senior government relations manager at AAUW, "The status quo is untenable for women with student debt. Imagine if there are cuts to Pell or to other financial aid programs. Women's \$833-billion problem could become even worse."

Research such as this underlines the importance of the financial aid that AAUW and branches like ours give to women seeking higher education. In light of it, our purses have even more purpose!

The science and math summer camp was designed to develop interest, excitement, and self-confidence in young women who are entering the eighth grade. The camp is hosted by AAUW-WA and is a program of the national American Association University Women (AAUW). Tech Trek began in 1998 in California and is being expanded across the U.S. to 15 camps in 12 states in 2017. Our first campers from the Stanwood Camano Branch were selected in 2014.

Each camper is first nominated by their respective science or math teacher at Stanwood Middle School or Port Susan Middle School and the finalists are selected based on essays and interviews by a team of AAUW members. When the panel selects the winners, a very important question emerges: Will going to a STEM camp truly make a difference in the education trajectory and motivation to stay on course in high school and college?

As most of you know, last year was the first time we awarded the Betty McCadden Tech Trek award. We established this award after Betty passed in 2015 and knew we wanted to always remember her and her dedication to AAUW's Tech Trek and Scholarship Program. Betty was a stellar leader in both initiatives and her passion for education always stood out.

The camper this year is Jolene Henrickson. Jolene received two teachers' recommendations and her essays on saving the environment with creative approaches stood out amongst the interviewing team.




Meet Our Members

Born in Jersey City, New Jersey, Valerie spent her childhood in Bradley Gardens – a very small town in central New Jersey on "what used to be a farm and so our home was on five acres of land".

Growing up "was very similar to what you would expect in the 50's and 60's. I came from a family where the sky was the limit. My parents were very



Valerie graduated from the University of Nevada, Reno with a BA in Economics and has a teaching certificate with a math endorsement. She was a teacher from 1980 to 2002 and a leadership teacher from 2002 to 2012.

Valerie has a younger brother and younger sister. "We all lived in NJ when I was growing up, however, my father wanted to move to the west coast but could not get my mother to leave her immediate family. So he thought if he got his children to move he would eventually get his wife there as well. All the children made it out west to go to college but my father passed away in 1975 never fulfilling his dream. I went to Catholic school for the first eight years and think it was the Nun my eight grade year that made me want to become a teacher because she was not very nice and I decided that I would be a nice teacher."

She enjoys hobbies of sewing, reading, quilting and hiking and has spent 3 months touring Italy (France, Spain Switzerland and Croatia) with her mother and sister. "I mostly travel with my sister because my husband is very much a homebody. We have been to Great Britain, Central America and Mexico. We did a Hawaiian Island Running Cruise and at each port we ran a race."

What would surprise us about you?

I am very uncomfortable talking in front of people, I work very hard not to let it be a problem but I stress about it all the time.

How long in the Stanwood/Camano area?

"My husband and I built our house in 2008 and moved up from Bothell to live here full time. However I mainly stayed in Seattle during the week because I was the Activity Advisor at the school that I taught at and most of my activities were in the evening and on the weekends. After having experienced that life style for 4 years I came home one day and told my husband that I wanted to retire, and I did so in 2012."

This is Valerie's first full year in AAUW joining in December 2015. She joined at the request of Cheryl Gruger and jumped right in as Membership Assistant in 2016 then full VP Membership in 2017.

What advice do you have for AAUW members?

"I think that this organization has a great focus. I like that we work hard helping women and girls have opportunities that they might not have if it wasn't for our organization. I think the thing that binds people around a common goal is when they forge relationships. I like that we now have the Day Trippers giving members a chance to meet others in a more recreational setting. I like that India Nishi has been trying to figure out how we can improve the way we function especially the idea that we have activities that will allow members to connect to other members outside the regular meeting day without losing focus of our goals."

What advice do you have for girls today?

"Be kind...Be respectful...Be curious...Ask questions...Learn from others with differing opinions from you...Don't just assume. Lastly, whenever you are angry – PAUSE & REFLECT – confront others with your concerns rather than gossip or talk behind other people's backs."



Helen introduced the guest speaker and AAUW member AnnMarie Hall, who spoke about careers in STEM, and the importance of collaboration, communication and listening skills development.

Helen introduced and honored the outstanding STEM students and presented each with a small AAUW memento.

Helen then turned the program over to Anne Milton, who stood in for Leslie Gitomer. Anne introduced the Tech Trek nominees for Summer 2017, followed by a ten-minute break.
