AAUW Funds in Action

Did you know that AAUW is one of the world's largest sources of funding for graduate women? During this 2017-2018 academic year, AAUW will be providing more than \$3.7 million in funding for fellowships and grants to 250 outstanding women and nonprofit organizations. Four of these women will be studying right here in Washington at the University of Washington.

- Logan O'Laughlin is a recipient of an American Fellowship with a Ph.D. in Feminist Studies. Her research will examine environmental protection discourses that emerge in response to hazardous waste and pesticide spills.
- Kristina van Niel has received a Career
 Development Grant in the discipline of health and medical sciences. She
 is pursuing training as a physician assistant in order to encourage the
 people in her community to make healthy lifestyle choices that are
 compatible with their personal goals and priorities.
- Stacey Wenzel, also the recipient of a Career Development Grant, is preparing for a career serving adults with acquired neurologically based language and cognitive disorders resulting from brain damage. Her goal is to advocate for her clients and teach medical staff how to appropriately communicate with patients in order to reduce miscommunications and medical errors and improve care.
- Betty Nalungwe is an International Fellow from Zambia who is pursuing a Master of Arts in Applied International Studies with Peace and Security. Having spent nearly 10 years with UNICEF in Zambia, she hopes her experience will help her strategize for emergency duty stations within UNICEF while providing a voice for vulnerable communities, especially women and children.

On a personal note, my dual membership branch, Wheaton-Glen Ellyn, IL, will be hearing from Rosemary Guzman, who is this year's recipient of the American Fellowship. She is pursuing a postdoctoral degree in mathematics at the University of Chicago, focusing on low-dimensional topology in hyperbolic 3-manifolds. Her work focuses on improving known volume bounds on a class of these mathematical objects and investigating further their geometric-topological interplay, especially on the level of geometric group theory. She also advocates for mentoring and more opportunities for underrepresented groups in STEM. She hopes to obtain a tenure-track position.

What an amazing breadth and depth of scholarship our contributions to AAUW Funds enable—something to keep in mind as you make your end-of-year contribution plans!

Diversity- "Unveiled"

On Tuesday, November 7, about 17 AAUW members and their guests carpooled to Skagit Valley College in Mount Vernon to attend "Unveiled", a one woman play written by and starring Rohina Malik. We stopped along the way at the delightful Calico Cupboard restaurant and had wonderful brunch-time meals which contributed to the specialness of the day.

At the college, we sat in the well-equipped and comfortable Phillip Tarro theater. The play exceeded the expectations of most of us, with Rohina providing an expert performance that caused many of us to get tears in our eyes. Wearing a hijab, she portrayed five different fictionalized but believable (and based on Rohina Malik's personal experiences or knowledge) Westernized Muslim women in a post 9-11 world, each of whom experiences hatred and bigotry brought on by ignorance and prejudice. The hijab and tea were central themes; each character talked about a different tea variety that she was drinking or serving. As the characters transitioned, her accent and demeanor matched. Each character illustrated a different facet of discrimination, and ranged from being a London rapper to a Moroccan attorney.

She has performed this play many places since she wrote it in 2008, including U.S. theaters, Ivy League schools, high schools, and venues in several other countries on at least three different continents. The list of awards she has won is very long. A review of her play in the Huffington Post states, "Using education to battle ignorance has become Malik's personal mission with 'Unveiled'." When some of us spoke with her after the play, she told us that she presents this play in as many public places and schools as possible in an attempt to educate against ignorance. Meet Our Members: Mary Chesney

Born in Detroit, Mary grew up in Duluth, MN. She reports, "The area is best described as the land of eternal ice and snow with mosquitoes large enough to haul off a small child but not to be confused with Alaska. When I was about 15 my sister had a boyfriend who was in the Navy ROTC at Marquette University in Milwaukee. She brought him home to meet all of us and I was totally smitten with him because he planned to be a pilot. I LOVED anything to do with flying and had decided I too would fly, for the Air Force. The problem was my parents didn't tell me girls had limits on what they could do. The boyfriend had the sad duty of informing me that girls couldn't fly for the military or any business. I was crushed but the Navy fighter jet posters remained on my walls for at least another year."

Mary has quite a few diplomas for that den wall: a Bachelor's degree in what is now called Family and Consumer Sciences (Home Ec.), a Bachelor's of Science in Nursing, a Master's in Public Health in Nutrition-Maternal/child and adolescen

in Nursing, a Master's in Public Health in Nutrition-Maternal/child and adolescent health focus, a Masters of Science in Nursing Education, and the last ("and I had to solemnly promise this to my husband") is a PhD in Public Health with a program planning and evaluation focus.

She has three adult sons and one grandson all living in Duluth, MN where she lived until she took a position with Washington State University Cooperative Extension Service in Snohomish County. "My husband and I joyfully moved west and have been living in Arlington for over 27 years-not nearly long enough."

Mary enjoys bread baking, hosting ("and of course eating") dinners, reading, hiking, bicycling and traveling to faraway places with strange sounding names. She has been to Mexico, England, Scotland, Norway, Netherlands, Germany, France (along the Rhine), and of course Canada. And ("drum roll please") Chile, Argentina, the Falkland Islands, Antarctica, Peru, and Ecuador in January and February-yippee!!!!!! Whew!

Mary has been a past member of AAUW for about three year just rejoining our branch this fall. She rejoined due to "the philosophy of the organization is to promote education for women and girls. Considering my story about what is was like to be a girl years ago, I want to help make sure no young girl ever again is told something she would love to do is not available because she is a girl." Her activities in AAUW are book group, Day Trippers and movie group.



That I successfully, and without any damage to myself or my bike, completed a 30 km fund raising bike ride this past fall on Vancouver Island.

What advice do you have for AAUW members?

Mentor any young woman you know. Keep encouraging them to realize their goals. Let them know that you are there to help them along the way and are available to listen to their dreams, hopes and fears.

What advice do you have for girls today?

Follow your interests and never let anyone tell you your dreams are not possible. Stick up for yourself because often no one else will. And remember to stick up for others, boys or girls, who are being belittled or demeaned.

Wine: Georgi Proulx announced that there were bottles of wine from the PWP event for \$5 a bottle.


