I saw this article on the National Website, and thought it was worth sharing their 10 resolutions for the year from their strategic plan that would then feed down to all the branches.

The first 3 resolutions have to do with the Work Smart Online course, designed to help women learn how to help us secure higher salaries and hourly wages more in line with our male counterparts. Though I realize many of us are retired, I like the ideas about passing this message on to our daughters, and other younger women that we may have close connections with.

- Take the new Work Smart Online course. This free, one-hour class is focused on teaching women to secure higher salaries or hourly wages, but it can also help you become a better overall leader and communicator — not to mention an ambassador for the course.
- 2. Encourage the women in your life to access Work Smart. Set a goal to ask at least 20 women, whether they be daughters, granddaughters, colleagues or fellow college alumnae, to register for the online course. Reach out via email, social media, or at our next book group meeting.
- 3. Make sure everyone in your AAUW branch takes the course. .
- 4. Help us learn about your community. We will be starting out the new year with an online survey for our members to see the subjects that interest our membership and how our branch can participate as a AAUW group. I hope it will answer the question of everything AAUW does, what is most important to you, and how do you think we can benefit our community.
- 5. Support a fundraising drive. PWP for example.
- 6. Be part of a national conversation on pay equity.
- 7. Develop your branch and state strategic plans to complement the national plan. This is a continuing effort by our branch.
- 8. Become a Two-Minute Activist.
- 9. Organize branch members to join in your advocacy efforts.
- 10. Create a plan for your branch to recognize Equal Pay Day on April 10, 2019.

Tulalip & Stillaguamish Grants Lynda Buehring

Thank you PWP Grant Team for having the insight and expertise for early submission of grant applications to the Stillaguamish and Tulalip Tribes. We discussed the process and cycles in March following through this summer with timely submissions.



AAUW Stanwood-Camano was awarded \$4000 from Tulalip and \$7000 from the Stillaguamish Tribes. Special thank you to Carolyn Spector, Lynda Buehring, Norma Mouton and Nancy Voelckers for working together on the grant applications and Jackie DeFazio and Gay Campbell for their consultation and experience. The Chihuly Donation Request was also submitted on December 17 for a monetary donation or artwork piece for our PWP Auction next year.

January Program: Suicide Prevention Speaker: Angie Drake

Angie Drake is the founder of Stanwood-Camano's local suicide prevention organization. She has a vast experience in suicide loss and suicide prevention. Since the organization began, Angie has spoken at colleges, hospitals, and has previously been a member of the Stanwood Camano school



Angie is trained in ASIST (Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training) as well as SAFEtalk (Suicide Awareness For Everyone) and certified as a support group facilitator. Since 2015, Angie has coordinated classes for suicide intervention skills training which has helped over 100 people get the skills needed to save a life. She also coordinated our local suicide loss support group which has proven to be very helpful for those who've lost a family or a loved one to suicide.
