Message from the President

Leslie Gitomer

As many of you know Tech Trek and STEM are programs and issues that I am very passionate about. I worked as an engineer for Boeing for 25 years and for about 15 prior to that was employed in civil engineering technical/construction jobs. I have seen the evolution of women employed in these fields since my early 20's starting with construction surveying, design/drafting and then on to engineering.

While reviewing the AAUW national site press releases last week I was pleased to come across proposed legislation in both in the House and Senate being introduced to support women and STEM; **the Building Blocks of STEM Act.** "The bill instructs the National Science Foundation (NSF) to more equitably allocate funding for research with a focus on early childhood. The bill also directs NSF to support research on the factors that discourage or encourage girls to engage in STEM activities, including computer science. **The Building Blocks of STEM Act** is a bipartisan, bicameral bill, introduced jointly by Congresswoman Haley Stevens (D-MI) and Congressman Jim Baird (R-IN) in the House of Representatives, alongside U.S. Senators Jacky Rosen (D-NV) and Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV) in the Senate."

Both the Congresswoman and Senators introducing the bill had a background working in STEM fields and definitely coming from a point of experience. Congresswoman Haley Stevens said, "This bill helps ensure that our children are prepared to fill the jobs of tomorrow by directing public resources to study opportunities for early childhood STEM education and strategies to encourage girls to engage in STEM and computer science." Kimberly Churches, Chief Executive Officer of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) echoed that sentiment. "The bipartisan **Building Blocks of STEM Act** will strengthen early childhood STEM education and lead to more effective policies and practices to increase the number of women in our STEM workforce." Another article on the AAUW.org website: "Helping Girls find their STEM passion" highlighted a woman, Kea Jolicoeur, who graduated in 2015 with a degree in Mechanical Engineering from California Polytechnic State University. She reported; "Tech Trek was my first hands-on experience in STEM. It was an incredibly unique experience that introduced me to the field of engineering. Before Tech Trek, I didn't even realize that engineering was a degree option in college." The article goes on to describe how Jolicoeur has returned to Tech Trek each summer to help other girls get inspired. She teaches robotics and engineering basics at the same AAUW camp in California she attended.

As a dorm monitor last year I was able to see firsthand the difference this is making in the girls' lives and had a student counselor to work with from Stanwood High School who had received a scholarship from our group as a 7th grader. She relayed to me how much she valued her experience as a camper and I could see how she additionally benefitted from attending as a counselor and meeting the other like-minded student counselors all following educational STEM pathways in high school and college.

reproductive health, affirmative action, pay equity, and family and medical leave. AAUW has a long-standing policy of nonpartisanship and does not endorse or oppose candidates for partisan elective office. AAUW does endorse legislation; thus we are non-partisan, but we are not non-political.

AAUW has always taken political stands on the critical issues of the day, as dictated by the member-adopted Public Policy Priorities. (Source AAUW Public Policy Manual.)




Meet Our Members

General Meeting Minutes - March 14, 2019

President Leslie Gitomer called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. Carol Kayler introduced Leyla Savloff, AAUW American Fellowship Recipient, studying at UW. She presented her research which centers on incarcerated women in her native country of Argentina. Her research underscores the importance of interdependence between women as one way to counteract oppression and abuse.

Jackie DeFazio spoke about national AAUW which now has 170,000 members and 1,000 local branches. She reminded us that AAUW is non-partisan, non-profit and values-based. Our organization will take positions on issues, not candidates. Jackie also shared AAUW's revised mission statement: "To advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education and advocacy."

Judy Prince, new branch member and President of AAUW Washington, discussed the resources available through the state website and the upcoming April meeting in Bellingham where Kim Churches, national AAUW CEO, will speak.

Business Meeting: Leslie Gitomer called the business meeting to order at 2:25 p.m. She reported that since a nominating committee has not yet been appointed, the officers of positions to be filled will discuss their duties during this meeting.

Minutes Approval: Cathlin Starke made a motion to approve the minutes from the February general meeting as they appeared in the March newsletter. The motion was seconded by Jackie DeFazio and approved by all.

Finance Report: Nancy Voelckers presented the monthly financial report. Our current assets from both operating and scholarship accounts is \$57,935.87. She also reported that \$9,500 has been sent to state for the 10 Tech Trek campers; this transaction will be reflected in next month's report. Nancy clearly outlined the duties of the VP-Finance with a handout. She said the VP-Finance-elect would shadow her next year and assume the position of VP-Finance in July 2020.

AAUW Funds: Mary Raymond discussed the AAUW funds options and referred to the chart printed in the March newsletter. The only question concerned our contribution to legal advocacy (currently \$1,000). The options were to donate solely to legal advocacy or to donate to the Economic Security Fund, which includes legal advocacy. Nancy Voelckers made the motion for our 2019 contribution to be \$2,000 to the Education and Training Fund and \$1,000 to the Legal Advocacy Fund. Mary Raymond seconded this motion and a hand vote showed the majority in favor so the motion passed.

President-Elect: Mary Chesney, President-Elect, spoke next about the need to have a job description for this office. She also stressed her desire to find a way to increase membership among younger, working women. She provided handouts from national about the responsibilities of the branch vice-president.

PWP Procurement: Mary Raymond gave an update from PWP procurement reminding members to bring in purses -- new and gently used. She also reminded members of two opportunities to get involved: 1) March 21 shopping/lunch trip to the outlet mall and 2) March 25 purse-cleaning party at Rose Olson's home.

Volunteer School Partners/Public Policy: Cathlin Starke reported that Marianne McGarry-Bloom has volunteered to be the School Partner's coordinator. She then described her position as Public Policy liaison. This is a voting board position and a good one to start with, requiring only about two hours each month. This officer will coordinate Lobby Day, write a brief newsletter article, and share applicable national website for information.

April Meeting: Carol Kayler announced that the next meeting will be April 12 at 5:30 p.m. and will involve a presentation on car care and maintenance.

Membership: Martha Huyler reported on membership and stressed the need to maintain members (currently 91). Dues (\$93) are payable now but not due until June. One volunteer is needed for the 1-4:00 p.m. shift at the Women's Expo on April 27.

Scholarships: Leslie Gitomer reported that the scholarship review team is in place, call for applicants is currently posted, and that scholarship applications are already coming in. She also reported that five days of Tech Trek interviews have been completed and ten girls have been selected. Camp volunteers are needed as dorm monitors and or nurses.

New Business: Leslie discussed voting at the April AAUW State Meeting in Bellingham. We are entitled to five votes; voting will be on Saturday. Norma Mouton announced that Norma Smith and Dave Paul will hold a Town Meeting on Saturday, March 23, at 2:00 p.m. at Stanwood High School. On May 6 Opal Smith, USC faculty member, will present "Keeping Kids Safe," a program on human trafficking. This will be held at 7:00 p.m. at Stanwood High School. Cathlin Starke distributed copies of an article concerning ways to prevent robot calls.

Cathlin made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 3:10 p.m. The motion was seconded by Kaye Sodt and approved by all.
