Message from the President

As most of you know, I am passionate about STEM, Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. I had an exciting career as an engineer and would like to see other young girls follow this path. I have been involved in Tech Trek selections for the entire time I have been a member of our local AAUW branch.

Every year while selecting the girls I always wish there was something more we could do for young girls interested in STEM. The scholarships for camp are great, and all the girls we have sent have really benefited from the experience. In recent years since our fundraising has increased, we have been able to send more girls, but I worry about the ones we couldn't send. How will that affect their future? Hopefully they continue their interest. As a result I always research other local opportunities and share them with the girls when we send them a letter informing them of our camp selection results.

There are some local AAUW groups that do host one day STEM workshops that are partially sponsored by AAUW. The name of this event is called Expanding your Horizons, https://www.eyhn.org/. The branches partner with a university, college or community college and supply organizational support and volunteers to host the event. The AAUW Edmonds SnoKing group this year hosted one such event in partnership with Edmonds Community College. To view information about the event that was held in March check out this link https://www.edcc.edu/eyh. This event is held during the school week and generally a school district will sign up to send a number of girls and provide bus transportation.

Skagit community college has also held a similar event this year (also during the school week) in partnership with Skagit STEM, http://www.skagitstem.com/spotlight-on-women-in-stem/. It would be great if we could convince our school district to send girls to one of these two events next year.

There is also an event on May 4 put on by Western Washington University in Bellingham. The name of this event is called GEMS, Girls in Engineering, Math and Science. https://ee.www.edu/youth-programs/programs/gems-academy-girls-engineering-math-science.

Another idea I had is possibly hosting monthly STEM events at our local library. There are resources on the national AAUW website for some of these activities. https://www.aauw.org/what-we-do/stem-education/stem-programs-for-girls/#curriculum. In the past, I was also involved in a program that Boeing Engineers used to take to the local Everett Schools called a "World in Motion." Some of that curriculum would work well in a library unit. Snohomish STEM is another local organization that hosts events throughout the year, https://www.snohomishstem.org/about/.

As you can see the possibilities to do more are endless. I wanted to put this information out there to plant some ideas for the future.

Hope to see you all on the evening of May 9 when we honor our High School STEM scholars and introduce our lucky Tech Trek campers for this year.


PWP Tickets Available NOW!

Purse Spotters: We need volunteers to act as spotters for the live auction portion of our event. Must be able to hear and be comfortable shouting out to draw attention to the bidders and final winner. This is a good job for husbands if they want to be part of the excitement.



Food Servers: We have confirmed the assistance of two adult volunteers who will help serve the meals with the students. We still need more adult volunteers to assist the student servers. Again, another good job for a husband.

General Meeting Minutes - April 11, 2019

The social half hour began at 5:00 p.m. with member-provided finger foods and coffee.

The topic of the program was "Cruising with Confidence". At 5:30 p.m., Carol Kayler introduced our speaker, Dawn Mettler.

President – call to order: Leslie Gitomer called the meeting to order at 6:20 p.m. and welcomed all members and guests announcing that we still need a Treasurer-elect for the 2019-2020 year. Members are welcome to self-nominate for this position.

Secretary – Approve Minutes from March member meeting: Cathlin Starke moved to approve the minutes and Jackie DeFazio seconded; the motion was carried.

Finance – review March budget: Nancy Voelckers provided a handout with the March, 2019 reports: Balance Sheet, Profit and Loss YTD Comparison, and Profit & Loss Budget vs. Actual. We have a \$48,044.21 balance; the expenses for the month were \$9500 for Tech Trek, \$100 for our table rental for the Women's Expo event, \$49.21 for Branch Programs, and \$287.64 for a three year contract for the Branch website. Income for the month was \$21.19 interest, and \$24.00 for Branch dues. She reiterated the need for a Treasurer-elect.

PWP – updates and request to members for purses and volunteers: Leslie told us that they still need more purses and are looking for volunteers to work at the event. Lynda Buehring reported that they have almost 170 silent auction purses, and are getting closer to the live auction target. She is encouraging new member participation to attend the steering committee meetings and to volunteer at the event. Cathlin Starke announced that ticket sales will begin on May 1, and we will be attracting women in the community who share our values in education. The event is on October 5, 2019. To order tickets, write a check to Stanwood Camano AAUW, and write PWP or Purses with Purpose on the comment line. 176 non-refundable tickets will be available, and entire tables for six or eight may be purchased. Beginning August 1, she will maintain a wait list. Please collect and provide full names, addresses, phone, and email addresses for your guests. The vendor, PB&J will do all of the processing and enter that information into a data base. Upon arrival, each guest will give PB&J a credit card to expedite purchases during the event.

Programs – upcoming meetings: Helen Smith reminded us that the next general meeting will be our annual meeting to honor our twelve High School Scholars and eleven Tech Trek recipients, and will be held at the Stanwood United Methodist Church. We need a new speaker, as the previously scheduled speaker will be out of town. Cake will be served along with a fruit plate or two. Two parking lots are available, one that is shared with the Floyd Center, and one is on the North side of the church building. The program starts at 7:00 p.m.; please arrive at 6:30 to help by greeting the students and their parents, volunteering for other duties, and mingling with our guests.

Membership – updates, Women's Expo, Dues: Martha Huyler encouraged everyone to bring guests to meetings and reported that we have a table at the Women's Expo. Membership dues are now due.

Tech Trek Program – selection process complete, camp volunteers: Terry Benson told us that they interviewed fifteen girls and their parents and chose ten girls. Then an unexpected donation came in, enabling us to pay for an eleventh girl in honor of Betty McCadden. We have met our dorm monitor obligation, but the program needs more adult volunteers. Leslie and Judy Prince both spoke about what a great experience it was.

Scholarship – **Deadline is May 15:** Leslie reported that the process is now underway to award four \$4000 scholarships this year to recipients who are college juniors or above. The deadline for applications is May 15, and candidates will be selected by June 5. The annual scholarship tea will be held, probably on June 23 at an undetermined location. We need a volunteer to host this event at their home.

High School STEM: Girls are selected, and preparations are being made for the May meeting.

Public policy –updates: We received an email from AAUW National to vote for officers and policies. Cathlin urges us to read the resumes of the candidates then vote for those who will uphold the AAUW values.

Old Business: AAUW State Meeting in Bellingham on April 12-13.

New Business: The Stanwood Camano news contains an article about member Katie Farrey, who has started a social justice book group. Cathlin has accepted the position of Membership Chair for the Camano Island Library Friends. She brought applications for those who wish to become Friends. Martha announced a free microchip clinic for dogs and cats at CASA on Saturday, April 13.

Adjourn: At 7:05 p.m., Kaye Sodt moved to adjourn, and Doris Taylor seconded. The motion was carried.

RAKU (an ancient way of making pottery) is an easy and exciting art-making process. No prior experience is necessary.

You will go home with a beautiful bowl which you decorated. Mary Pilkington and other AAUW members have attended these workshops and highly recommend them.
