She will also discuss the signs people should watch for that could alert them to offer help to a survivor, statements that are helpful to say to a survivor, and what things we as a community can do to help survivors of childhood sexual abuse.

Pay Equity & Your Right to Vote

Being brave and sticking out her neck is something Megan Rapinoe, the leading player for the winning United States Soccer Team, has been doing with the Fédération Internationale de Football Association (FIFA). Even though many continue to believe girls should sit down and be quiet about the "generosity" they receive in pay, Megan isn't afraid to stand up and point out the discrepancies.

According to an October 18 article by Melissa Murphy of the Associated Press the women earned \$4 million for winning the World Cup while the men earned \$38 million. (<https://www.apnews.com/ae1ac46aa0c044cdba8181a8dd0f33b2>)

FIFA said they are going to raise the reward for all winning women teams from \$30 million to \$60 million while the men received \$400 million in 2018. Oh, and I failed to mention the raise for the women doesn't take place until 2023. FIFA states the lower payout is because of attendance.

According to Soccer Stadium Digest men averaged about 24,500 per game this year, a 3 percent decline from 2018.

Soccer Stadium Digest (<https://soccerstadiumdigest.com/2019-nwsl-attendance/>) stated the average attendance for women's games this year was 12,000, a 22 percent increase from the previous year. I am not a mathematician but if the attendance at women's games is approximately 50 percent of the men's, at a minimum shouldn't their wages reflect the same? How does \$60 million equal half of \$400 million?

I am sharing this continuing example of unfair pay with you so you will keep it in mind as you go to the polls. No matter what the race, having people on boards or councils in villages, towns, and cities who understand that equality must apply to all does make a difference.

Fair is fair and the shallow excuses for discrimination must end.

Supporting AAUW's Mission through PWP

In the afterglow of the great success of this year's *Purses with Purpose* event, it's important to take some time to reflect on how this branch's contribution to AAUW's National Funds can best support both AAUW's mission and our own goals in working to raise those dollars. A majority of the funds, of course, will stay right here in our own community, providing scholarships and Tech Trek grants to local women and girls. In addition, the branch will contribute to AAUW's national funds to address gender equity at large.

Currently, AAUW Funds emphasize support for the three pillars of the AAUW Strategic Plan as you will see by the titles of the funds. Each fund provides needed dollars to program and policy initiative necessary to accomplish AAUW's mission of achieving gender equity for all women and girls. As we approach the time to designate the areas branch funds will support, it seems appropriate to review the options.

The **Education and Training Fund** addresses the barriers and implicit biases that hinder the advancement of women by championing equal access to education and ensuring that education at every level is free from sex discrimination. Important programs funded by this fund include STEM, Title IX, AAUW's Fellowships and Grants, and AAUW Research initiatives.

The **Economic Security Fund** ensures livelihoods for women through achieving pay equity, providing training in salary negotiation, and deepening women's retirement security and quality of life. Programs funded include Start Smart, Work Smart, and the Legal Advocacy Fund (which offers support against sex discrimination and harassment in higher education and the workplace. This includes personal support during a trial, community outreach and funding amicus briefs to support a case.)

The **Leadership Fund** is aimed at increasing the number of women in leadership roles, particularly in education and nonprofit organizations.

Finally, the **AAUW Greatest Need Fund** allows the national organization to use the money in the areas deemed most important to the strength, relevance, and vitality of AAUW into the future.



Purses with Purpose: How'd We Do?

Purses with Purpose Benefit Luncheon and Auction held on October 5 was the best one yet. This would have not been possible without the contributions of so many members, businesses, and the community. Donors of purses and certificates, our organizers, and support volunteers spending hours behind the scenes all impacted the success of this year's event.



Numbers are preliminary. Our treasurer, Nancy Voelckers, compiled the receipts and expenses and at this point our net income for the event (including the \$11,000 tribal grants) is \$52,332.07.

A more detailed report will be presented when the final numbers are available. The board will review and present a Scholarship Budget for membership approval at the January 9, 2020 general meeting.

1935—Branch Beginnings

The Stanwood-Camano Branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) began as the Arlington Branch of AAUW, with an organizational meeting in December 1935. AAUW members from Seattle met with the group in January 1936 to explain more about the history and purpose of AAUW. There were 16 charter members at the first formal meeting of the group in April 1936. We'll be profiling these and other early leaders of our branch in future newsletters, but a general overview of the founding members reveals that 12 of the 16 were teachers; they ranged in age from 22 to 50. Their degrees and fields of teaching ranged from science to economics, English to liberal arts, commercial education to social science to mathematics. These were active women and involved in their schools and later in communities.



First, of course, they were all college educated women, which meant they were in a very small minority in the country. They came from families that not only had the means to educate their daughters, but also the belief that women could and should obtain college degrees. All born before women had right to vote in national elections (1919). Most would have remembered WWI. All would have remembered the October 1929 stock market crash; all experienced the worst of the Great Depression.

They were living through rapidly changing and often tumultuous times. They shared the ability to support themselves by virtue of their education, at a time when many people lacked the education or skills to do so. We can only surmise why they decided to form this branch when they did. Georgia Harris, one of the founders, later wrote: "Desire of women of similar experiences and training to get together for study and discussion as well as for social reasons, brought about the formation of the Branch in Arlington." The first impetus was self-education and meaningful relationships with other educated women in the community; it wasn't until later that the branch began actively supporting local women and girls' education. The first year was, in the words of Georgia Harris again, "spent largely in studying history, purposes and accomplishments of AAUW. History of education of women in general was also studied."

Meet Our Members

Bonnie Cavell

Born in Minneapolis, MN with farming parents from a small South Dakota farming community, Bonnie came to idolize her older brother in her younger years and of course loves dearly to this day. Their childhood was spent primarily in South Minneapolis suburb of Richfield moving when she was five then five years later having a second brother who "I practically raised because he was born as I was outgrowing dolls." Her sister was born three years later; "yes, my parents rather had three families! I doted on the two younger siblings through high school years."



"Most significant in my education was my desire to continue with parochial school after 8th grade which found me in all-girl institutions of learning for the next 8 years. I felt empowered by my single gender education because it afforded an opportunity for independence in an era where girls were still restricted by encouraging feminine pursuits. It also leveled the playing field of economic stratus with mandatory uniforms in high school."

Selecting a college major, in Bonnie's middle class situation, truly only offered nursing or teaching even though accounting or veterinary medicine would have been her preference. "I graduated from the college of Saint Theresa in Winona, MN, although I spent my last semester at Saint Katherine's College in Saint Paul (CST) due to finances and having the opportunity to live at home. CST offered a five year program for nurses which allowed me to earn a BS degree with a nursing major and I had a psych minor. My intent was to get a masters in pediatric psychology but my 'master' became my husband. Continuing education course in various areas of nursing as well as having a business repairing windshields and acquiring a real estate license kept me stimulated."

Bonnie was a pioneer in Emergency Medicine for many years, establishing a branch of Emergency Room Nurses in both Washington and Minnesota as well as creating a program called MtScene which enabled rural Montana hospitals to transport critical patients with uniform descriptions of symptoms as well as measures that first responders could take to make a difference in patient outcome. Public education, both in the ER and in the community also gave her an opportunity to share her education with others. "Although I took a break from medicine to pursue other interests, I always returned to nursing primarily in critical care areas and eventually in managerial positions. I was fortunate to retire in the mid 90's as the shake up in health care was in its infancy. I held licenses in Minnesota, Washington, Montana, California, Nevada and Kansas, working in all states except California."

"Obviously, I have moved frequently in my early adult years but have been blessed to find 'home' on Camano Island for the past 23 years. No children for either my husband or myself (second marriage) but we consider our two standard poodles our family."

"I am a 'fixer' of things having owned 14 apartments in the late 60's early 70's, and, as I tease my husband I say, I brought more tools into our union than he did. We have been fortunate to travel for years until age has slowed us a bit, and I now occupy my time reading, playing bridge, caring for my family, enjoying friends and family (all of whom reside in Minnesota to this day), attending plays and the Met opera via satellite, working outdoors, contributing to our community and currently living that double life of 'seasonal' people having a winter home in Arizona."

"Our favorite destination is Italy with New Zealand coming in second, and we have been to each several times. My trip of a lifetime was our African vacation. Other European countries and India and China are also on our passport."

What would surprise us about you?

I was an accomplished motorcycle rider as well as a keen shot and, although I got my deer and gutted her, once is more than enough for that.

WHAT: Lincoln in the Bardo by George Saunders

WHEN: Monday, November 4, 2019, 2:00 p.m.

WHERE: Thea Wellington's Home

Set over the course of that one night and populated by ghosts of the recently passed and the long dead, Lincoln in the Bardo is a thrilling exploration of death, grief, the powers of good and evil, a novel - in its form and voice - completely unlike anything you have read before. It is also, in the end, an exploration of the deeper meaning and possibilities of life, written as only George Saunders can: with humor, pathos, and grace. On February 22, 1862, two days after his death, Willie Lincoln was laid to rest in a marble crypt in a Georgetown cemetery. That very night, shattered by grief, Abraham Lincoln arrives at the cemetery under cover of darkness and visits the crypt, alone, to spend time with his son's body. Willie finds himself in a strange purgatory-- the bardo-- where ghosts commiserate quarrel, and enact bizarre acts of penance and where a struggle erupts over his soul.

General Meeting Minutes - October 10, 2019

Program: History of Our Branch Founders and Stanwood-Camano School District presentation on the February 11, 2020 school levy vote and progress on the high school construction.

Treasurer's Report: Nancy Voelckers presented the financials for September. As of September 30, 2019 the balance in Operating and Scholarship accounts was \$36,939.87. Included in Nancy's report was a comparison report showing budget amounts to actual expenses. She explained how the scholarship funds are distributed to scholarships, Tech Trek and AAUW Funds and any proceeds from PWP must go to scholarship funds not operations. It was moved and seconded to accept the Treasurer's report; motion approved.

Program: Carol Kayler announced the November 14 meeting will be Mary Knight, a survivor's point-of-view regarding human trafficking. December 12 is our Holiday Luncheon at the Cama Café; please sign up to help with the set up and tear down for this event.

Good of the Order: Cathlin Starke asked for members to consider joining the Friends of the Camano Island Library. Membership drive goes through October. They have quarterly meetings.

Candidate Forum: Elaine Richards shared the Candidate Forum is scheduled for Wednesday, October 16, 6:30 p.m. at Stanwood Middle School. She has received participation confirmations from 21 candidates. Jackie DeFazio will act as facilitator, and Cathlin Starke will organize the questions. Please arrive at 6:00 p.m. to help with set up.

Adjournment: Kaye Sodt moved to adjourn the meeting; Elaine Richards seconded; motion carried; meeting was adjourned at 2:10 p.m.
