## Branch Beginnings: Our First Branch Officers

Celeste Gertrude Moll Murphy was elected first president of the Arlington Branch of AAUW, in April 1936. Born in Washington in 1901, Celeste graduated from the University of Washington with a major in Liberal Arts. While at the U.W., she served as Junior Class Representative to the Board of Control, ASUW. She covered sorority news for the Tyee yearbook, and was a member of the Women's League and Alpha Chi Omega. Celeste was a member of the Junior Prom Committee, the Charity Committee, and Tolo Club, and chaired the Women's Executive Council in 1923 (representing the Women's League). She was a reporter for the U. W. Daily. After graduation, she married Harold Murphy, also a graduate of U.W. They had a son and daughter. The couple moved to Portland, but later returned to Snohomish County. Celeste died in 1981 and is buried in the Arlington Municipal Cemetery alongside her husband.



Vice President Alice Satre was born in Minnesota in 1892, lived in Choteau, Montana, and moved to Washington in 1915. Following graduation from the U.W., she taught in the Choteau area where in 1918 she co-chaired a pie social to raise money for the Red Cross. Returning to Washington, she lived on Depot-Logan Road in Stanwood while teaching. She taught at Longview and Everett, as well as Arlington. She served as publicity chair for the Arlington PTA in 1940. At Arlington High School she taught English, served as advisor to the school newspaper, and directed at least one play at Arlington High School. She was elected vice president of the Washington Classroom Teachers Association in 1947. Alice never married. She spent her last years at Josephine Sunset Home and after her death in 1981, was buried in the Anderson Cemetery in Stanwood.

Georgia Harris, Secretary, was born in Iowa in 1890 or 1891. Handwritten Branch records report that she graduated from Colorado University, but an Arlington High School yearbook indicates that she had both a B.A. and an M.A., graduating from the U.W. and Columbia University. While it is not known when she moved to Washington, by 1920 she was living and teaching in Kent. A few years later, she was teaching Social Science, Girls' Athletics, and serving as Dean of Girls at Arlington High School. She was also advisor to the high school Girls' League. Georgia remained strongly committed to AAUW, serving as State Board Treasurer in 1948-1949. She died in Seattle in 1976.

Treasurer Livola Alice Meyers was born in King County in 1904, the daughter of Norwegian immigrants. She attended Queen Anne High School, participating in French Club and Girls' Club; her motto was "Tis great to be an inspiration to others." At the University of Washington, she studied Liberal Arts. At Arlington High School, she taught mathematics, and served as Freshman Class Advisor. By 1939 she was the Senior Class Advisor, which judging by the student activities and achievements she supervised, could almost have been considered a second job! In one year, this class, under her mentorship, produced the play "Charley's Aunt," planned the Senior Ball, gave a Mothers' Tea, gave the Valentine party for Juniors, and held Pep and USO assemblies; in addition, 3 seniors were in the all-school play, 8 lettered in football, 4 lettered in basketball, 6 lettered in tennis and 1 lettered in debate. Twelve of the class were in the Honor Society, and one senior girl was first in the county for Essay and Oratorical contests. Liv later moved to Renton, where she taught mathematics until her retirement. By 1952 she had taken classes at the University of California and Columbia University. In 1955, she was serving as Secretary-Treasurer for the Washington State Mathematics Council. By 1960 she was head of the Mathematics Dept. at Renton High School. Liv never married. She passed away in 1990.

These women shared the ability to support themselves by virtue of their education, at a time when many people lacked the education or skills to do so. We can all be proud of their accomplishments and their commitment to women's education, which helped motivate the founding of our branch back in 1936.

We determined we should have met for lunch after the movie because "Harriet" stimulated conversation that needed more time than we spent sharing our comments while saying our goodbyes.



Kathy Cunningham: "The poignancy of Harriet's story and the desperation of the enslaved was narrated without an overly heavy hand in politicizing the horridness while the narration held the fire of her words and inspiration. The power of song was woven throughout Harriet's story: the sorrow in the church scenes and the goodbyes and the call to freedom she signaled."

Netflix will release the DVD in December. Georgi will be setting up a viewing and lunch when she receives the DVD probably in January. Kathy suggests that you may want to read up on Harriet Tubman in preparation for the discussion that will follow. She recommends the following:

## Meet Our Members

Born in Riverside, California, Robin shares, "I spent my childhood growing up in Riverside when the population was 47,000. Today it is seven times that at 330,000. I had an older and younger sister. My Dad was the foreman at a local manufacturing plant, and my mom was a housewife. We had a nice middle class home in a great neighborhood where we could walk to school, and I lived there through high school. My mom went back to college when my younger sister started school and graduated from the University of California Riverside with a Teaching Credential and eventually worked at UCR teaching teachers. My sisters and I all graduated from college."



Growing up she remembers, "I was very independent and spent a great deal of time with my girlfriends in the neighborhood and their families. I was in Girl Scouts, went to a summer camp during the 4th and 5th grades and loved being on my own. My sisters, friends and I joined the National Charity League "Ticktockers" which had a mission of fostering mother-daughter relationships in a philanthropic organization committed to community service, leadership development and cultural experiences. I participated in that organization from the seventh grade until I graduated from high school and consequently worked many hours at the California School for the Deaf, which was very near my home."

Robin attended California State Universities San Diego and Fullerton graduating with a BA in Art. "I met my husband in high school and while we went to different colleges we got married in 1972 and continued to live and work in Riverside. I had two children and lived in a home next to the University of California Riverside. My children were able to attend a neighborhood preschool and walk to elementary school just as I had. I had a career job with the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, so my husband became the primary caregiver for the children. I went back to college at UCR earning a B.A., M.A., and PhD over the next few decades while working as a journalist, archivist and professor. We helped the children obtain their undergraduate degrees and one became a lawyer and the other a pharmacist. We stayed in Riverside until 2014, when we sold our home and retired to the Pacific Northwest."

Robin has been in the Stanwood/Camano area for five years this past August and is "brand new" to AAUW. She joined because "I like the people I have met who are members, and I really enjoyed listening to the eighth grade students that attended the STEM camp -- a very worthy and motivating cause." She jumped right in volunteering at Purses with Purpose this past October.

Robin's hobbies and interests are art, nature, architecture, history, and genealogy. "Most of our travels have been in the United States or Canada."

## General Meeting Minutes - November 14 2019

**Call to Order:** President, Mary Chesney, called the meeting to order at 2:17 p.m. She shared thoughts of care for Linda Lynn and her husband, Gary, during this time of his recovery.

**Survey:** Mary Chesney shared the results of the survey emailed in October. 41 people (50% membership) responded. Results: Half of the respondents did not attend the September or October meetings. It is still being determined why members are not coming to meetings. Collection of data will continue at the December luncheon. The survey remains open if one missed the initial invitation. Email Georgi Proulx for second emailing.

**Holiday Luncheon** at Cama Café on December 12: Tickets on sale for \$26 each. New for this year – Table Decoration Contest. Georgi Proulx asked for signups to decorate a table. Guests will vote on their favorite, and a prize will be awarded to the winner. There is no budget in the ticket price for supplies; decorations will be taken home by the decorator.

**Minutes:** September 12, 2019 Meeting – Martha Huyler motioned to approve minutes as printed in the October newsletter; Cathlin Starke seconded; motion passed. October 10, 2019 Meeting – Joyce Leak motioned to approve the minutes as printed in the November newsletter; Mary Anne Schradi seconded; motion passed.

**Treasurer's Report:** Nancy Voelckers presented the financials for October. As of October 31, 2019 the balance in Operating and Scholarship accounts was \$78,928.94. Included in Nancy's report was a comparison report showing budget amounts to actual expenses. She explained this total was after 2019 PWP and all bills and credit card fees have been paid. \$40,000 will be invested in an 11 month CD at Heritage Bank this week. Rate is 1.8%. Cathlin Starke motioned to accept the report; Mary Pilkington seconded; motion approved.

Nancy reported net proceeds for 2019 PWP including the grants is \$52,252.51. Grant amounts: Tulalip \$4000 and Stillaguamish \$7000. The net proceeds for 2017 were \$41,006.

Nancy also shared that she and the board are working on the Scholarship Budget that will be posted in the January 2020 newsletter for membership review and voting approval at the January 9 meeting.

**Art Education:** Marianne McGarry-Bloom described the Art Education program that she, Nancy Voelckers and Jackie Olson gave to the first graders at Stanwood Elementary School this past month and their plans to return next week to continue with a workshop on the element of art line. The project will be creating a maple leaf rubbing. There was lots of excitement from the students and teachers. Jackie was surprised that for many this was the first time using watercolor paints and the quality of the supplies was not consistent. Her recommendation was they all should be using Crayola for the best pigment. After discussion Jackie Olson motioned that members bring Crayola "8 color" watercolor sets to the December luncheon to gift the students in the workshop; Jill Johnstone seconded; motion passed.

**Branch Leadership:** Mary Chesney discussed the open leadership branch positions: Chairs for the 2021 PWP and Public Policy. It was announced that Marianne McGarry-Bloom has accepted the Scholarship Chair position and will be working closely with Anne Milton, previous Scholarship Chair. Job descriptions are being assembled for all board and leadership positions to include the monthly commitments.

**Good of the Order:** Cathlin Starke asked for members to consider joining the Friends of the Camano Island Library. Martha Huyler shared that with membership the new benefit to holding a library card is that the card holder receives a \$7 per week credit for printing at the library: color and black/white.

**Adjournment:** Nancy Voelckers moved to adjourn the meeting; Martha Huyler seconded; motion carried; meeting was adjourned at 3:15 p.m.
