Due to our 501(c)3 status mandates, we cannot allow direct family members of our SC-AAUW membership to apply. 
Eligibility Requirements - All students, female and male, who meet the following requirements are encouraged to apply.


- You must be a current resident of the Arlington, Stanwood, or Camano Island area AND/OR be a graduate of Lakewood, Arlington, Stanwood, or Lincoln Hill High Schools.
- You must have completed at least 2 years of study at an accredited college or university by June 2021 and have verifiable plans to continue upper-division or master's level post-graduate work at an accredited 4-year college or university in the fall of 2021.

We will award our recipients at a virtual Scholarship Tea at 2:00 pm, Sunday June 13, 2021.

#### Pilgrimage to Eternity by Timothy Egan

"At a time when Britain, America, and much of Europe have never been so secular--and when his mother's death and his Irish Catholic family's complicated history with the church prompted a reckoning with his own beliefs -- Timothy Egan decided to follow in the footsteps of centuries of seekers. He embarked on a thousand-mile pilgrimage through the theological cradle of Christianity, to explore one of the biggest stories of our time: the collapse of religion in the world that it created. Egan sets out along the Via Francigena, once the major medieval trail leading the devout to Rome, and makes his way overland via the alpine peaks and small mountain towns of France, Switzerland and Italy. The goal: walking to St. Peter's Square, in hopes of meeting the galvanizing pope who is struggling to hold together the church through the worst crisis in half a millennium. Making his way through a landscape laced with some of the most important shrines to the faith, Egan finds a modern Canterbury Tale in the chapel where Queen Bertha introduced Christianity to pagan Britain; parses the supernatural in a French town built on miracles; and journeys to the oldest abbey in the Western world, founded in 515 and home to continuous prayer over the 1,500 years that have followed. He is accompanied by a quirky cast of fellow pilgrims and by some of the towering figures of the faith--Joan of Arc, Henry VIII, Martin Luther."

#### Once Upon a River by Diane Setterfield

"The Swan, an ancient inn on the Thames River in the town of Radcott, stands at the center of this magical tale full of riveting, complex characters and storylines. The drowned body of a very young girl is brought to the Swan late one night, and she is mysteriously revived. Who is she? Why was she found in the river? How did she come back to life? The marvelous cast of characters who frequent the Swan and live near Radcott speculate and become drawn irresistibly into her story." – from the Indie Next List. (Setterfield is the author of The Thirteenth Tale, which the book group read several years ago.)

## **AAUW Founding Mother, Marion Talbot Remembered** *Jackie DeFazio*

(Author's Note: As I have been sorting through AAUW files from the distant past, I found this transcript of a recorded interview with Louise J. Molkup, made in 1987 by two members of the Chicago Branch, in which Louise recounted her personal memories of Marion Talbot, AAUW founding mother, who Louise first met in 1919 when she was an entering freshman at the University of Chicago, where Talbot served as "Dean of Girls." I knew Louise well as she remained an active member of the Chicago Branch and of Illinois AAUW until her death. Below are excerpts from a transcription of that taped interview as they appear in that transcript. I never met Talbot, but the transcript perfectly reflects my memories of Louise.)

"The last time I saw Dean Marion Talbot was at the AAUW National Convention in Dallas, TX, in 1947. She was exactly as I remembered her from school a long, long time before that. She was a little woman, always dressed in very correct black; usually a high-necked blouse, with a little white ruching at the top which framed her face. She was a grandmother figure, even though she was someone of importance and dignity, someone whom you would honor and respect."

"I met Miss Talbot first in the course of registration. She asked me what subjects I was taking. I told her I would like a major in Latin and a minor in Greek. Then she told me a story, and I have remembered it all my life; it is a good little story. "She grew up in Massachusetts, and she had brothers and she had boyfriends, brothers of her girlfriends, and they were are good friends together in preparatory school. But when it came time to go to college, there wasn't a single school in the east that was co-educational. The men closest to her went to Harvard, and she wanted to go to Harvard; Harvard wouldn't even think of it."

"But she studied at home, she had their books, and she listened to their talk when they got home during the holidays. Thus, when it came to examination time, she could answer the questions on the examinations as well, if not better, than most of the boys in her group. Well, that made her very cross. If she was good enough to compete with them, why couldn't she sit with them in class? This was the beginning of her feeling that there should be judgment on merit. It didn't matter if she was a girl, it didn't matter if she was somebody's sister, it didn't matter what color she was, nor her religion, nor anything else. If she was able to do the work that was required as well, if not better, than the boys, she thought she should be judged on the merit of her grades."

"Finally, Boston College, she got there with one or two of her girlfriends, and Boston College gave them some sort of degree that recognized the course of their studies parallel to a degree at Harvard."


[There follows a lengthy conversation about Talbot's arrival at the University of Chicago, at the request of William Rainey Harper (first president of that university, now considered the "Harvard of the Midwest), because, in Louise's words, "As long as he was coming out here where women had to be educated, he wanted someone to come along to represent the cultured women of the east." Louise continued her friendship with Talbot via correspondence at first and later as both were members of the Chicago Branch of AAUW. Later in this interview she details this lesson she says she received from Talbot.]

"I was on the Board of the Chicago Branch and Chairman of the Annual Card Party to raise money for our local charities. It was always a very lovely affair. Miss Talbot looked in but she didn't stay. she said privately to me later that it was a disgrace that women of our education could find nothing better than playing cards to raise money. Well, we did find other ways—such as compiling a recipe book, writing a play about our history, hosting a second-hand book sale, etc."

"Marion Talbot gave us the feeling that the desire for perfection in anything that we had any contact with was one of the great goals of life. She was and she is and she always will be a role model for the AAUW on what they [sic] stay for, what they look for in the betterment of our country and our lives."

#### Branch Beginnings: Mary Katherine Brown Mathews Carolyn Spector

Our branch of AAUW was formed in Arlington in 1936 by a group of 16 women. This is one of a series of articles profiling the women who founded our branch.





Mary was born on October 22, 1893 in Tracy, Minnesota. Her mother died when Mary was only two years old. By 1900, she and her younger brother were living with an aunt and uncle in Lyon. Little is known of the intervening years; in 1920 she was married to Joseph Mathews and residing in Worley, Idaho.

By 1930, the U.S. Federal Census shows Mary and Joseph living in Arlington with their three children. Joseph was an attorney in private practice and Mary was not working outside the home. In 1936 Mary was one of the women who founded our branch of AAUW, in Arlington. She remained active in AAUW for many years; in 1945 she was a member of the State Board, as well as Historian, still living in Arlington.

Mary died on February 22, 1975 and is buried at Arlington Municipal Cemetery.

As a follow up to our "Branch Beginnings: Doris Marsh" in February, current member, Trish Coan, shares

I do have some first-hand knowledge of the second Doris Marsh. She was Miss Marsh to me, and my second grade teacher at Lincoln Elementary, a brand new primary school in Arlington in 1954. I clearly remember some of the activities in her class. We went on a field trip to the Vienna Bakery, owned by the Duskin family. Then we made bread, as well as ceramic salt and pepper shakers in the shape of bread loaves. I also wrote a long note to Miss Marsh and forged my mom's name on it, inviting my entire class to a sleepover at our cabin on Camano. Mom gave it to me years later. I still have it, along with the salt and pepper shakers.

Her father published the newspaper, the Arlington Times, which was sold to future state representative, Sim Wilson in 1964. I wonder if the older Doris was a relative of the Marsh family.

She was not a young teacher, but not old either. She seemed to me to be slightly younger than my mother, who was born in 1913. I'm positive she wasn't born in 1885. The 1923 date would also be too early. I remember she and my mom seemed to know each other when I saw them together. My mother was a member of AAUW and possibly Miss Marsh was also. She may be the founder we're looking for. My mom was M. Ilene Snyder Jones. She grew up in Arlington, but left for college and didn't return until the early 1940's.

**Programs**: Kathy Cunningham stated the program for March 11 program is Title IX. April 8 program is Bellingham author Cheryl McCarthy. Meeting will be delayed to accommodate the speaker and begin at 2:00 p.m.

**Membership**: Norma Mouton shared the introduction of Membership Spotlight in the February newsletter. Honoring a current member highlighting their contributions to the branch. This will be a recurring article to demonstrate to membership the various positions of leadership.

In celebration of Galentine's Day, February 13th, Lynda Buehring of the membership team had a drawing for two Galentine's Day gifts. Winners: Mary Pilkington and Kathy Cunningham.

**Public Policy**: Cathlin Starke reported the success of our participation in Lobby Day with interviews with Ron Muzzall, Dave Paul, and Greg Gilday. There were six representatives from AAUW Stanwood Camano sharing 15 minutes with each legislator. Lobby topics were family leave bill and pregnancy care bill. Responses were received from each of the three legislators to our follow up communications. Cathlin invited new members and visitors to check out the national and state websites for our organization.

**Tech Trek**: Mary Chesney reported girls in 7<sup>th</sup> grade this year will only be offered the virtual experience in 2021; there is no option for them to attend in-person in 2022. Recruitment process has begun for 2021 camp. Tammie Goodwin, Doris Taylor and Diane Cohn have volunteered for the selection committee. Notification to state is May 1. Discussed opening up the nominees to Lincoln Academy and Arlington alternative middle school this year. Consensus was that all public middle schools in Stanwood and Arlington would be approached to nominate girls for Tech Trek.

**Scholarships:** Marianne McGarry-Bloom shared our virtual scholarship tea will be Sunday, June 13 at 2:00 p.m. Two-three \$4000 scholarships will be awarded to Juniors, Seniors and Master's candidates. March 1 is the beginning of the scholarship application period ending April 30. Application and information have been added to our scholarship listing on WashBoard.org. Our branch website will post the application on March 1.

**PWP**: Jackie DeFazio announced the next event will be a live in-person event on April 30, 2022. Donations of purses, new and gently used, are being encouraged. Purses can be delivered to Rose Olson.

**High School STEM Scholars:** Judy Prince reported Lois Ruskell is working on the candidates for this honor.

**Adjourn:** Cathlin Starke moved to adjourn the meeting; Joyce Leak seconded; motion passed. Meeting adjourned at 3:03 p.m.
