Tech Trek Update: We Have Nominees!

I am a skeptic. I doubted we would receive any applications for camp because of the virtual format. We received no applications from Arlington, a first for them. But...we did receive applications from the Stanwood-Camano school district, spread across three schools. The schools are Port Susan and the Stanwood Middle School and one of our new contacts,



Saratoga School. Saratoga is the home-schooling program for the Stanwood-Camano School District. All schools combined notified us that 12 girls were nominated and provided the information to apply; only six nominees chose to submit their application. I believe that we got the nominations from the Stanwood-Camano district because of our long and successful relationship with them.

Each application was reviewed to determine if the nominee would be asked to interview. It was important to focus on the potential success for the campers. To avoid unintentional bias, our written comments about the nominees were shared with each other without committee member's names. We determined that all six of the nominated girls would move to the interview.

In preparation for the interview process, a poll was developed to determine when of each of the committee members would be available for interviews. A poll was also developed for the families to choose a day and time for the interview that both the nominee and the parent/guardian would be present. Meanwhile, the committee reviewed the existing interview questions. We wanted to avoid yes/no questions, remove questions that do not apply to a virtual camp, and add questions that pertain to this year's camp. The committee members also identified which questions they would ask campers.

All the nominee's families received an appropriate email regarding the interview process. Following the interviews, the nominee's responses will be discussed. Those who will be invited to attend camp will receive an email with the news while any who we believe would not be good candidates for camp will receive a thank you for applying but will be informed they were not selected. The interview process will begin the week of March 29th.

2021 AAUW National Election - Please VOTE!

It's your AAUW, and your voice matters!

This spring, AAUW members will vote on a long-standing membership requirement, which creates a barrier to women who do not hold a college degree. By eliminating this requirement, AAUW can become a more diverse and inclusive organization, better aligned with the needs of women today. In addition, members will have the opportunity to vote on the proposed Public Policy Priorities for 2022-23.



The AAUW bylaws require that the affirmative (yes) vote of two-thirds of the votes cast is required to amend the bylaws. Changes to the bylaws would be effective immediately. AAUW's national staff will be prepared to change membership language, the join function, and other related items as necessary immediately after the vote.

The Public Policy Priorities can be amended with an affirmative vote of a majority of the votes cast. Changes to the Public Policy Priorities are effective for the 2022-2023 fiscal years (July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2023).

AAUW International Fellow Named Director General of WTO! *Jackie DeFazio*

In case you have wondered about the impact of those AAUW Fellowships we help fund!

On March 1, 2021, Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala became the first African and the first woman to lead the World Trade Organization. Born in Nigeria in 1954, she graduated magna cum laude from Harvard in 1976 with an AB in Economics and earned a PhD from MIT (Massachusetts Institute of Technology) in 1981, with support from the AAUW International Fellowship she received in 1977-78.

Okonjo-Iweala's career spans 25 years at the World Bank as a development economist, rising to the position of managing director of operations. She also served two terms as finance minister of Nigeria (2003-06, 2011-15), the first woman to serve in that office. In 2005, Euromoney named her global finance minister of the year. Currently she sits on the boards of Twitter, Standard Chartered Bank, and the Global Alliance for Vaccines and Immunization (GAVI).

Additionally, Okonjo-Iweala is the founder of the Center for the Study of Economies of Africa, a development research think tank based in Abuja, Nigeria, and NOI-Polls, the first ever indigenous opinion-research organization in Nigeria. She is married to Ikemba Iweala, a neurologist, with whom she has four children, one of whom is author Uzodinma Iweala. The family resides in the United States. Okonjo-Iweala became a US citizen in 2019.

Membership Spotlight: Marianne McGarry-Bloom

The Value of Education by Marianne McGarry-Bloom

It is said that no education is ever wasted. As a member of an organization which has learning as its core value, I feel privileged to help college and university students attain their goals. Chairing the AAUW-SC scholarship committee for the past two years has given me the opportunity to strengthen a new generation of students who will become our future leaders. I believe there is nothing more important than helping our young women and men in their educational pursuits.



Our branch's mission statement says it most succinctly. "Advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy and research." Applicants for our yearly scholarships are asked to write an essay describing their relationship to this mission statement. What makes our scholarship unique, is its focus on college or university students in their junior, senior, or master's degree years of study. This is a time when many students' other scholarships have come to an end, and their financial needs continue.

As a public education teacher of 30 years, my Bachelor and Masters degrees in Education were an invaluable golden ticket to a lifetime of joy in my vocation. A scholarship in 1971 to Seattle University started me on a path that has given meaning and purpose to my life. My focus was to advocate for students whose learning styles were sometimes atypical of the usual "readin', ritin' and 'rithmetic" centered curricula. My Masters Degree was in this form of teaching through the creative arts. Two thirds of our students fit into this other category of learners. What a treasure to get to see them flourish through igniting their own style of learning. Howard Gardner of Harvard's Education Department championed this concept in teaching to the 7 Intelligences: verbal linguistic, logical mathematical, kinesthetic, visual spatial, interpersonal, intrapersonal, and musical rhythmic. If a lesson is taught through all 7 intelligences, every student in a classroom will have the opportunity to learn. This method changed my teaching and eventually the love of learning for my students. You can see the diverse learning styles in our scholarship applicants. It is the AAUW's mission to support these diverse learners, and it has been such an honor to be involved in this worthy endeavor. The commitment is quite small, but the dividends to our applicants and our collective future is quite grand.

Pre Program Announcement: Judy Prince commented on the virtual Chinese Farmer Art program and art sale presented by the Edmonds branch on March 13. Register for the meeting to receive the invite and be able to bid on the art work.

Call to Order: Judy Prince called general business meeting to order at 2:16 p.m.

Secretary: Motion to approve minutes as printed in March newsletter. Martha Huyler moved to approve, Cathlin Starke seconded; motion approved.

Treasurer: Judy Prince presented the February 2021 financial reports for Jeanie Garrioch. Operating account had very few transactions. Total assets are \$56,293.23.

Nominating Committee: Judy Prince shared the positions looking for nominations: President-elect, VP Finance-elect, Secretary, and appointments for Public Policy and Program Assistant positions.

Programs: India Nishi reported April 8 program is Bellingham author, Cheryl Stritzel McCarthy, sharing her book, <u>Many Hands Make Light Work</u>. Program will begin at 2:45 p.m. to accommodate the presenter; business meeting begins at 2:00 p.m. May is set for the HS STEM Scholar Recognition. June program is the virtual scholarship tea.

National By-Law Proposal: Judy Prince discussed the upcoming vote on the proposal to remove the graduation requirement from AAUW membership. Reason for change is to demonstrate the equity of women and girls with or without the degree if they believe in our goals. Additional consideration is the difficulty of grant eligibility if our organization is exclusionary.

Membership: Norma Mouton described the current shortage of membership in our branch, suggested a recruiting campaign, and sharing information with her for follow up. Cathlin Starke shared Marianne McGarry-Bloom's husband is having severe health issues and she may need help with the scholarship search.

Tech Trek: Judy Prince reported for Mary Chesney that Tech Trek nominations from the middle schools are minimal and no applications have been submitted. In addition to lack of interest in a virtual camp, Doris Taylor shared the timing for asking for nominations is bad since the schools have just returned to in person learning and teachers are overwhelmed.

SC School District Retirements: Superintendent Jean Shumate and Assistant Superintendent Lloy Schaaf are retiring. The district is asking for community participation in their superintendent search survey. Link has been emailed to the membership.

Adjourn: Norma Mouton moved to adjourn the meeting; India Nishi seconded; motion passed. Meeting adjourned at 2:39 p.m.
