# Membership Spotlight: Are We Lucky or What? Nancy Roberts

At age 82 I have begun spending more time reflecting on the periods and events of my life. The word that keeps coming to mind is "luck." Throughout the joyful and traumatic times, there has always been the intervention of outcomes that feel attributable, at least in part, to that somewhat magical force that brings a positive outcome. And so it is that I consider our AAUW Stanwood Camano branch a lucky organization, for me and you. Where else in my life has there been a more satisfying group for that part of me that values: social interaction with phenomenal, accomplished women, the opportunity to make a difference on a local level as well as national, and the availability of participating in continued learning.



I moved to the island in 2002 and joined AAUW a short time later. In 2012, when I was approached about serving as secretary, I elected to volunteer to be treasurer, thinking it would be simple, like managing my personal bank account. I attended a board meeting and found out that a chairman was needed for the art show, our annual fundraiser at the time. Leadership has always been a non-intimidating thing for me, so I raised my hand, thinking, "Anything to get out of being treasurer!" I talked Kathy Cunningham into being my co-chair, and together we oversaw a show that grossed the lowest percent of profit in the 30 years of its history. Times in the community had changed and it was time for our group to change as well.

I served on a committee to come up with a different fundraising idea. I had learned of a purse auction put on by an Everett group, which sounded like a plausible alternative. Several of us attended that auction and found it to be fun and profitable. Not sure if the idea would work, we decided to try it. Jo English and Beverly Maxwell chaired that first year's purse auction in October 2013, at The Floyd, and our doubts vanished. Norma Mouton and I chaired the second year 2015, moving to the Camano Center where there was more room; Jackie DeFazio and Gay Campbell took the reins in 2017 and Lynda Buehring and Norma Mouton in 2019, making improvements each year. So far a wildly successful event!

In the end we know that the "magic" of luck comes through the willingness and work of people dedicated to the success of our branch, and our fundraiser and other activities are what binds us as a group. Leadership becomes easy because members readily (mostly) volunteer. So let us stop for a moment and give thanks for the luck we all share by the existence of our branch.


