Happy 85th Anniversary AAUW Stanwood-Camano Helen Smith

In celebrating our branch's 85th year, we reprint one of a series of articles authored by Helen Smith and published in our October 2011 when our branch turned 75 revealing a bit of history of AAUW's contribution during the years 1935-1945.



As you may know, the national AAUW organized in 1881, 130 [140] years ago. The organization focused on voter education, legal advocacy and issues of sex discrimination. My favorite historical note, quoted often by Jackie DeFazio is that in 1885 a group debunked the popular theory that higher education was bad for women's health. This study established AAUW's commitment to cutting-edge research relevant to the struggle for gender equity in education and society.

Moving on to 1935, in Arlington, Washington, a group of women met to organize women of similar experiences and training to get together for study and discussion as well as for social reasons. This brought about the formation of our branch first in Arlington. In December of 1935, fourteen women were present to meet with three representatives from Seattle. The organization's aims and departments were explained, a constitution was adopted, and dues were sent to National in April of 1936. There were sixteen members. The first year was largely spent studying the history of education with emphasis on women's education.

75 [85] years ago, AAUW nationally established a social studies committee to address a widespread interest in consumer problems and broader social and economic issues following the Great Depression. This committee worked to develop a well-rounded program that ranged from housing to individual liberties, consumer problems to mental health issues.

By 1940 National established a refugee aid fund to assist women fleeing foreign dictatorships. Many branches contributed to this effort. After the war, it became the Reconstruction Aid Fund to assist people in recovery. Organizers sent over \$41,000 on the effort, and branches and individuals sent thousands of gift parcels and school supplies to European countries and Korea. By 1941 war involvement meant that AAUW recorded skills helpful in the war effort, and many members assisted this nation-wide effort. The Arlington branch studied consumer issues during 1940-41 years.

Nationally by 1943, member Florence Siebert won the first AAUW Achievement Award recognizing scholarly or professional achievement. She was recognized for the first reliable TB test, as well as safety improvements of IV injections. In 1945, members were sponsoring women from warliberated countries to come to the US to study.

Call to Order: India Nishi called meeting to order at 2:18 p.m.

Member Recognition: India Nishi recognized Cathlin Starke for helping with the summer board meeting including lunch and facilitating the exercises.

Secretary: Georgi Proulx presented two sets of minutes for approval: Motion to approve the April 8 general meeting minutes and the June 13 annual meeting minutes as printed in the May and September newsletters, respectively was made, Nancy Voelckers seconded; motion approved.

Treasurer: India Nishi related the report Jeanie Garrioch gave at the board meeting for July and August. Scholarship funds were paid. Operating account had income from membership; outstanding \$35 check for the farmer's market fee that will be voided since we didn't participate. Total assets are \$45,598.65.

Branch Priorities: India Nishi shared the results of the priorities established by the summer board meeting in July. First is Membership Recruitment and Retention. Ideas from membership team will be initiated during the year. Second: Successful Programs, and we agree that so far we're doing great. Thank you Kathy Cunningham, well done. Third: Generating Participation and Leadership.

Communications: Georgi Proulx announced that branch wide emails (newsletters, reminders, rosters) will be sent via the board Gmail account: aauwscboard@gmail.com instead of her personal email. Georgi also discussed the effort this time of year to increase branch visibility on Facebook and social media in preparation for Stanwood Camano Give in November, a community on-line giving campaign.

Purses: Jackie DeFazio reported that we have 7.5 months to go until Purses with Purpose, and we need at least another 100 purses, new and gently used.
