
receive special recognition by our branch for their achievements in STEM fields.



be able to introduce these wonderful and exceptional young women to the

Public Policy: Equal Pay Day Judy Prince

Equal Pay Day symbolizes how far into the year women must work to earn what men earned in the previous year. 2022 Equal Pay Day was March 15. But because the pay



gap varies significantly among different communities, other Equal Pay Days have been added to the calendar to reflect that fact that many women must work far longer into the year to catch up to men.

This year, these dates have been designated using a new methodology: The COVID-19 pandemic pushed many women, especially women of color, into part-time or seasonal work, or out of the workforce all together. Because of this, past methods of calculating the wage gap fell short of accurately capturing the full picture.

Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander Equal Pay is this month, May 3, 75 cents for every dollar paid to white males. Some room for improvement here. If Asian American women were removed from this calculation; I think the Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander women might be closer to the end of the year. Black Women's Equal Pay Day is September 21, 58 cents for every dollar. Indigenous Women Equal Pay Day is December 1, 50 cents, and Latina Equal Pay Day is December 8, 49 cents.

If the goal of Equal Pay Day is to raise awareness about the gender wage gap it has certainly been met.

When she dies, she leaves Ronni a very generous bequest only if Ronni completes a book about her life within one year. As she's drawn into the world of young Violet, Ronni is mesmerized by life in a simpler time. It's an irresistible journey filled with revelations, some of them about men Ronni knew as octogenarians at Fairfield Springs. Struggling, insecure, flailing at the keyboard, Ronni juggles her patients, a new boyfriend, and a Samsonite factory of emotional baggage as she tries to craft a manuscript before her deadline. But when the secrets start to emerge, some of them in person, and they don't stop, everything changes."

<u>How to Fly in 10,000 Easy Lessons</u> by Barbara Kingsolver WHERE: Home of Joyce Leak

In her second poetry collection, Barbara Kingsolver offers reflections on the practical, the spiritual, and the wild. She begins with "how to" poems addressing everyday matters such as being hopeful, married, divorced; shearing a sheep; praying to unreliable gods; doing nothing at all; and of course, flying. Closing the book are poems that celebrate natural wonders-birdsong and ghost-flowers, ruthless ants, clever shellfish, coral reefs, deadly deserts, and thousand-year-old beech trees, all speaking to the daring project of belonging to an untamed world beyond ourselves.

A Knock at Midnight: A True Story of Hope, Justice, and Freedom by Brittany K Barnett

"An urgent call to free those buried alive by America's legal system, and an inspiring true story about unwavering belief in humanity-from a gifted young lawyer and important new voice in the movement to transform the system. Brittany K. Barnett was only a law student when she came across the case that would change her life forever-that of Sharanda Jones, single mother, business owner, and, like Brittany, Black daughter of the rural South. Brittany's riveting memoir is at once a coming-of-age story and a powerful evocation of what it takes to bring hope and justice to a system built to resist them both."
