In partnership with Stanwood Camano News, this year's Candidate and Issues Forum will be in Zoom Webinar format, a third for our AAUW branch in the many years we have presented this Forum. This is a great opportunity for the

community to meet and ask questions of our candidates and hear the issues for the November election. This year we have many candidates, including the District 2 Congressional race, the 10th Legislative District, PUD candidates and Snohomish County Prosecuting Attorney. There are assorted Island County races that include Commissioner for District 3, Sheriff, Clerk, Assessor, Auditor and Treasurer.

This Forum has been presented before every major election year since 1998 and has great attendance by candidates. Ballots will be mailed on or near October 14. The Forum is intended to provide candidates an opportunity to let voters know about their experience and qualifications for the office they seek.

Tech Trek Going Forward

As a result of our generous donors, we have funding for at least 10 campers and possibly more for next summer. I sent out information about the camp to



multiple principals in late August to help increase participation from the Arlington and Lakewood schools and the Stanwood home school program. My plan was to follow up the letter with a phone call in late September or early October. Then I got the following news from our state camp administration.

"For the last 10 years (since the first Tech Trek camp in 2013), the administration of the camp has been facilitated pretty much by the same group of people. All of us love the program, but it is time for some to move on with their lives."

Public Policy: AAUW State Focus



The AAUW Washington 2022 Legislative priorities will focus on 9 bills which are reflected in health care, education, human trafficking, pay equality and preservation of abortion access. Our understanding of these bills and priorities can help guide our own January 2023 Lobby Day actions and next steps. Below are the highlights:

- **Keep Our Care Act (HB 1809)**-Health entity mergers and acquisitions must improve access to affordable quality care.
- **Concerning Protection and Services for Indigenous person**: Missing, Murdered, Trafficking. (HB-1571)-provides amber alerts, hotline information, healing center.
- Creating Teaching endorsements in Computer Science (SB 5389)
 -allow current teachers to be qualified to teach computer sciences. This
 will allow greater accessibility to computer science courses and skills to
 underserved communities.
- Sexual assault nurse examiner training (HB 1621) Department of Health establish stipend program for licensed nurses to become certified sexual assault nurse examiners. Helps underserved communities.
- Increasing availability of sexual assault nurse examiner education in rural and underserved communities. (HB 1622)
- **Higher Education Affordability (HB 1659)** modify the income eligibility thresholds. Allows for expenses beyond tuition—books, supplies, lab fees, child care, transportation.
- Changes to Paid Family Leave (SB 5649) easier for workers, health care providers and employers to utilize.
- **Pay Gap Legislation (SB 5761)** requires employers to provide wage and salary information to applicants for employment.
- Preserving Abortion Access (HB 1851) preserve ability to access abortion care. Prohibits the state from taking action against an individual based on pregnancy outcomes or for assisting a pregnant individual.

DEI (Diversity, Equity and Inclusion) Spotlight Katie Farrey

Equity is giving all people fair treatment, access, and opportunity. Barriers that prevent full participation need to be identified and removed. Some groups are historically underserved and underrepresented. Rebalancing these conditions will help to provide everyone with equal opportunities.

Tightrope by Nicholas Kristof and Sherly WuDunn

Nicholas Kristof grew up in rural Yamhill, Oregon, an area that prospered for much of the twentieth century but has been devastated in the last few decades as blue-collar jobs disappeared. About one-quarter of the children on Kristof's old school bus died in adulthood from drugs, alcohol, suicide, or reckless accidents. And while these particular stories unfolded in one corner of the country, they are representative of many places the authors write about, ranging from the Dakotas and Oklahoma to New York and Virginia. These accounts provide a picture of working-class families needlessly but profoundly damaged as a result of decades of policy mistakes.

Leaving his job and his old life behind, Harry makes his way to the remote woods of northeastern Pennsylvania's Endless Mountains, determined to lose himself. But fate intervenes in the form of a fiercely determined young girl named Oriana. She and her mother, Amanda, are struggling to pick up the pieces from their own tragedy--Amanda stoically holding it together while Oriana roams the forest searching for answers. And in Oriana's magical, willful mind, she believes that Harry is the key to righting her world. Now it's time for Harry to let go...Harry's Trees is an uplifting story about the redeeming power of friendship and love and the magic to be found in life's most surprising adventures"



Call to Order: Nancy Voelckers called meeting to order at 7:47 p.m.
