Even if you are not absolutely sure you are available (and I do not yet have the July dates), please reach out to me. There is a \$500 stipend for helping at camp as well as round-trip mileage. When I volunteered as a dorm mom, I had a private room if that is of any help in deciding to volunteer.

Public Policy: Your Voice Does Matter Anne Milton

Approximately 100 AAUW members participated in the Lobby Day workshop and the chosen speakers highlighted the research, data and resources for legislative bill support. The priorities are: harassment/discrimination, healthcare privacy, sexual



reproductive rights, economic security and apprenticeship programs. The legislative session started only 3 weeks ago and over 1200 bills have already been introduced. These priorities need attention and focus by your legislators. There are various ways to denote your voice or support: letter writing, email, voicemail, live meeting, virtual meeting, etc. and you needn't be an expert. This link: legislative updates from the AAUW Policy Team AAUW-WA team is a tremendous resource. (I will be forwarding an email with helpful resources like questions for your legislator or aide, specific bill details, talking points, one-minute pitch and 'the ask'!)

One Lobby Day Speaker, Cathy MacCaul from AARP, stressed the need to advocate for the elderly or the older adult in legislative advocacy efforts. Whether it be housing, medical record privacy, or internet savvy, she emphasized: "Ask every time- What about older adults? How does this bill play out for your elderly constituent?"

Lastly, the Lobby Day advocacy team denoted the first step is getting to know your legislators. You can sign up for weekly updates directly from your legislators. I have found the weekly emails from Legislative District 10, namely Representative Clyde Shavers and Senator Ron Muzzall to be very informative.



Supporting AAUW's Purpose via Purses with Purpose! Jackie DeFazio

As we approach the beginning of planning for Purses with Purpose 2024, here is a reminder of what this signature branch event is making possible this year.



At our January 2023 branch meeting members present adopted the branch's scholarship budget for

this year. Thanks to the hard work of our members, the Stanwood-Camano Branch will be supporting a minimum of seven Tech Trek campers (\$1,100 each) and three college scholars (\$10,000 each) from right here in the greater Stanwood-Camano community as well as contributing \$3,000 to support the national organization.

All these funds have been raised and will be used in support of AAUW's charter purpose "to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research." That means that local young women and girls will be receiving \$37,700 during 2023 with the potential for a similar amount being available in 2024, given the success of PWP 2022 and the generosity of local donors on Giving Tuesday.

The additional \$3,000 contributed to our national organization will be divided equally between AAUW's Education and Training Fund, which is used for fellowships and grants and research projects as well as other programs that "address the barriers and implicit biases that hinder the advancement of women" and AAUW's Greatest Need Fund where it will be used to "respond rapidly to new and emerging challenges facing women and girls."

Makes you want to say "yes" when that request comes to help with PWP 2024, doesn't it?

General Meeting Minutes - January 12, 2023

Program: Rena Priest, Wa State Poet Laureate, virtual presentation, Community Resource Center and Zoom.

Call to Order: Nancy Voelckers called meeting to order at 2:11 p.m.

Secretary: Georgi Proulx presented November 10, 2022 minutes for approval as printed in the December newsletter. Motion to approve: Jackie DeFazio moved, Judy Prince seconded; motion approved. There was no business meeting on December 15 as it was Holiday Luncheon.

Treasurer: Judy Trammell reviewed the financial reports for November and December. Operating account had activity from luncheon checks, accounting fee, and school district room rental; current balance is \$3896.27. Total assets are \$80,613.72.

Scholarship budget for 2023 was presented for vote of approval as printed in the January newsletter with three changes for 2023: Tech Trek donations anticipated at \$2200 equivalent to the amount of our Stanwood Camano Give project, award amounts for university scholarships increased to three scholarships at \$10,000 each (formerly at \$6000 each), and Tech Trek participant quantity was set to seven at \$7700 total because although we have funds to send more campers we had not received a commitment for a member to attend as chaperone or teacher allowing more than seven. Gay Campbell moved to approve the scholarship budget, Katie Farrey seconded; motion passed.

Membership: India Nishi shared Joanne Drewsen is doing a terrific job with the Call Chain and mentioned the new Java Break gathering on January 18 to cultivate new members and connect current members.

Programs: Rose Olson and Doris Taylor discussed the February 9 general meeting at the Camano Library featuring Megan James, the Tulalip Tribe prosecuting attorney, talking about Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Violence Against Women. Opening the meeting to the public was discussed, and Doris will get input from Megan then follow up with Georgi before January 18 if we need to publicize in the Crab Cracker.

Public Policy: Anne Milton related the themes for Lobby Day on January 30 are Legislation and Gender Equity; broadband access is also on topic for the day. Lobby Day is virtual and has a \$15 registration fee. Anne graciously offered her "kitchen table" for viewing as a group that morning.

Tech Trek: Mary Chesney reported that all schools in Stanwood, Arlington and Lakewood school districts have received the nomination information and applications that are due back to her on January 26. She explained that the Covid vaccine requirement may be an impediment to the nominated girls accepting the camperships.

Governance Committee: Jackie DeFazio explained this committee will review the branch bylaws and the upcoming proposed changes in the national bylaw guidelines that will be available for viewing after January 16. She encourages the membership to take a look at the guidelines on the national website and offer their comments to the committee: Jackie DeFazio, Martha Huyler, and Georgi Proulx.

STEM Scholars: Nancy Voelckers announced two new members Lael Williams and Linda Demetre, have volunteered to co-chair the STEM scholar committee, have begun learning the process, and planning the calendar for contacting the high schools.

DEI: Katie Farrey reported the branch DEI committee has met and is continuing preparation of our branch DEI document.
