


# Public Policy: Equal Rights Amendment Anne Milton

Editors' Note: The ERA has been ratified by 38 states, seemingly meeting the required three-fourths needed to be approved. However, some of those states adopted it after a congressionally mandated deadline had passed, raising questions about the validity of those actions.

The focus of this September update will be the Equal Rights Amendment and the advocacy measures that are now underway. According to

recent polling, 85% of Americans across gender and party lines support the Equal Rights Amendment.



The Senate failure instilled even more momentum for change and the ERA Caucus is now forcing a Vote in the US House of Representatives. The process is called a "discharge petition"\*. It will get all the representatives in the US House to vote on HJRes25, the bill to remove the deadline and acknowledge the ERA as the 28th Amendment. The petition was filed on July 19 and would allow Nevada, Illinois and Virginia to count towards ratification, thus passing the threshold to recognize the ERA as part of the Constitution.

Congresswoman Abigail Spanberger offers this clear summary: "Across our Commonwealth and across the country, generations of advocates pushed to guarantee constitutional protections against discrimination on the basis of sex — only to have their decades-in-the-making achievement blocked by an arbitrary deadline. But Congress has the power to honor the states' decision to enshrine the ERA as the 28th Amendment to our Constitution." "A century is too long to wait for equality. The resolution to affirm the ERA and remove the arbitrary time limit deserves full consideration in the House. This discharge petition\* is a powerful act; the movement for equality will not be stopped."

There are seven WA House Representatives that have already signed the discharge petition including Rick Larsen who represents our branch's voting district (CD2). It is truly the branches and members who are the voice and strength of AAUW. What you say matters and elected officials do listen to their constituents.

Lastly, after the Senate defeat, Senator Schumer immediately filed a motion to reconsider allowing him to bring the bill to a second vote later this Congress. Senator Gillibrand then followed up and initiated the H.J.Res.82 bill to remove the ratification deadline and ask the US Archivist to file/publish the ERA as the 28th Amendment.

Stay tuned and I will keep you further updated as we progress on these vital initiatives.

\*A discharge petition is a procedural rule that enables the minority party in Congress to force a vote on an issue without a report from the committee by 'discharging' the committee from further consideration of a bill or resolution. After a bill has been introduced and referred to a standing committee for 30 days, a member of the House can file a motion to have the bill discharged. The discharge petition must gain 218 signatures to advance.




# DEI (Diversity, Equity and Inclusion) Spotlight Katie Farrey

Founded in 1973, PFLAG is the first and largest organization dedicated to supporting, educating, and advocating for LGBTQ+ people and their families.

Definition from PFLAG Skagit:

**Definition:** LGBTO+ is an acronym that collectively refers to individuals who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or queer. The addition of the Q for queer is a more recently preferred version of the acronym as cultural opinions of the term queer focus increasingly on its positive, reclaimed definition. The O can also stand for questioning,



referring to those who are still exploring their own sexuality and/or gender. The "+" represents those who are part of the community but for whom LGBTO does not accurately capture or reflect their identity.




