





Public Policy: Upcoming State Legislation *Anne Milton*

During the last two months, the focus for this monthly policy report was 'Equal Rights Amendment' and pay equity. Both have legislative actions ahead but are currently stalled at the federal level. Our state AAUW Public Policy team is now prioritizing the legislative



bills that may get some attention in addition to the state budget actions.

AAUW-WA is first highlighting Bill HB 1837, known as the vending machine contraception bill. According to Kelly Cleland, Executive Director of the American Society for Emergency Contraception: "the 2022 ruling overturning Roe vs. Wade is putting people's lives at stake, so it makes pregnancy prevention all the more urgent. If you live in a state where you cannot get an abortion and you can't get an abortion anywhere near you, the stakes are so much higher than they have ever been before". The University of Washington led the way last November with the first installment in a campus library of a vending machine stocked with ibuprofen, pregnancy tests and the morning after pill. The machines are now part of a push on college campuses to ensure emergency contraceptives are cheap, discreet and widely available. There are now 39 universities in 17 states with emergency contraceptive vending machines and it's growing. Some, such as the University of Tulsa in Oklahoma, are in states where abortion is largely banned.

Bill HB 1837 would allow public colleges to apply for a \$10,000 grant that would support installation and upkeep of these vending machines. (The state has set aside about \$200,000 total for schools to establish additional vending machines.) A pharmacy student, Zoe Amaris at UW noted that there was a stigma associated with getting access to this medication. Although the morning after pill has been approved by the FDA for over-the-counter sale, many pharmacies keep it locked up behind the counter, requiring identification for purchase and making the experience of purchasing it intimidating.

A new report on Book Bans and Curriculum Gag Orders by the Federal House Oversight Committee was released last week. The AAUW-WA Policy committee expects to see several state bills introduced in 2024 that will address book bans and curriculum as well as protections for educators and librarians from disciplinary actions related to the "culture wars".

Accordingly, Activist groups have challenged hundreds of books across the country, predominantly asserting that popular children's books are actually vehicles of liberal indoctrination. The escalation of these efforts to delegitimize teaching, ban books, and prohibit teaching certain subjects in the classroom contributes more stress to teachers already reeling from the pandemic and related safety measures.

In fact, a survey conducted by the National Education Association revealed that 55% of educators said that they are more likely to leave education sooner than they planned because of the pandemic and that 90% of educators cited "burnout" as a very serious or somewhat serious issue.



DEI (Diversity, Equity and Inclusion) Spotlight Katie Farrey

Founded in 1973, PFLAG is the first and largest organization dedicated to supporting, educating, and advocating for LGBTQ+ people and their families.

Definition from PFLAG Skagit:

Intersex: A term used to refer to people who are biologically between the medically expected definitions of male and female. This can be through variations in



hormones, chromosomes, internal or external genitalia, or any combination of any or all primary and/or secondary sex characteristics. While many intersex people are noticed as intersex at birth, many are not. As intersex is about biological sex, it is distinct from gender identity and sexual orientation. An intersex person can be of any gender identity and can also be of any sexual orientation and any romantic orientation. PFLAG National opposes the practice of genital mutilation on infants and children who are intersex. Formally, the medical terms hermaphrodite and pseudohermaphrodite were used; those terms are now considered neither acceptable nor scientifically accurate.

Gifts to AAUW Produce World-Changing Women and Research Jackie DeFazio

For nearly 135 years, AAUW has funded the educations of women so they could follow their dreams. From astronauts to zoologists, the recipients of AAUW's fellowships, grants and awards represent nearly every imaginable field of endeavor. Overall, we've given more than \$135 million to over 13,000 women and nonprofit organizations around the world.



This funding has a tremendous impact. It helps to ease the burden of student debt, which disproportionately affects women, so that promising women can excel in their fields and become leaders in business, government, academia, community activism, the arts and sciences. Among the women whose academic work has been supported by AAUW are Marie Curie, the first woman to win a Nobel Prize and astronaut Judith Resnik, the second woman to travel in space.

In addition, we've published hundreds of research reports, from an 1885 paper disproving a prevailing myth that college impairs a woman's fertility to, more recently, a study documenting the economic impact of workplace sexual harassment. And today AAUW has a prominent voice in the national conversation about the gender pay gap, anchored in our annual publication of *The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap*.

Continued support from generous members and branches like Stanwood-Camano will ensure that AAUW can continue to invest in world-changing women and research through its fellowships and grants program for many decades to come. Let's all keep that in mind as we make decisions about end-of-year giving.




Member Moment

Call to Order: Following the presentation by Cat Olson, the general meeting began at 1:52 p.m.

DEI Land Acknowledgement: Katie read the land acknowledgement honoring our native peoples and land.

Sunshine Report: Mary Ann Schradi asked us to let her know if a member needs a sympathy or cheerful card, and she will arrange it.

Prior Minutes from September General Meeting as Printed in the October newsletter: Kathy Cunningham moved to approve; Mary Raymond seconded, and the motion was carried.

Finance Report: Robin reported. Income included dues from two members, \$9.89 in money market interest, a \$150 donation for purses, and a \$1,000 PWP business sponsorship donation from Dick and Bonnie Cavell. There were no expenses and assets total \$44,385.22.

PWP 2024: Jackie DeFazio reported. We are still collecting purses, and have about half of those needed. The goal is to have all purses collected by the end of January. Mary Pilkington has obtained gift cards totaling \$600 to go into the purses. We were advised to check with her before asking any potential donors for donations to make sure we are not asking the same businesses more than once. Georgi has re-configured seating at the tables, so that if needed, we can sit more attendees.

SC Give: Mary Raymond told us that everything has been submitted and accepted. On November 1, we can start publicizing, and Georgi will handle posting on the website and on Facebook.

Membership: Joanne Drewsen told us that new members can join under the "Shape the Future" benefit, which will save them a substantial amount of money; Martha prepared a poster about it. The membership committee will meet on October 18 and will propose goals.

Programs: For the November meeting on November 9, we will have Celeste Mergens, founder of "Days for Girls", from Mount Vernon as a speaker. This meeting will be held in a meeting room at the Camano Center and open to the public; links regarding this meeting can be shared with non-members. The Camano Center will include information in their newsletter in case their members want to attend. Celeste will autograph pre-purchased books.

Public Policy: Anne Milton discussed that the passage of the ERA should go hand and hand with pay equity which has not improved in 3 or 4 years. With current problems in the U.S. Congress, not much is happening right now. In regards to pay equity, women are still behind men in earnings, particularly minorities. On the AAUW website, there is information and encouragement about how to summarize and articulate requests to get more money in the workforce.

New Business: Mary Pilkington told us about a national non-profit organization "Reach Across America", a veteran's group. Nationally, volunteers place wreaths on graves of 2.3 million veterans. Volunteers are needed this year. Please contact Mary Pilkington for details.
