Public Policy: Lobby Day Anne Milton

The 2024 legislative session starts on January 8 and it is a short 60-day session. Washington State AAUW is hosting our annual Lobby Day on January 22 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. It will be held virtually on Zoom to encourage all members to join.

The session will open early at 8:30 a.m. for a "meet and greet" which will be an opportunity to interact with others, but this half hour will not be led by any one individual.



Lobby Day speakers will start at 9:00 a.m. and will discuss Voting, Media Literacy, Girls at Risk and various topics from our lobbyist, Nancy Sapiro.

The cost is \$10.00. When registering, please provide your email and the zoom link will be sent a few days before the event. If interested, I am providing a second link to obtain the weekly legislative updates on the lobby day priorities.

Pay Inequality: both the Washington state Congressional District and Legislative District data has been finalized. This data outlines pay ratios and also includes data on the percentage of female households (single and single with kids) living below the poverty level in both Congressional and Legislative Districts.

See the attached WA State Pay Gap Data Spreadsheet taken from the December 2023 AAUW-WA newsletter. As anticipated, the rate varied a lot. In Congressional District 1(Federal Way, Highline) it was 67 cents for every dollar compared to Congressional District 9's (Kirkland, WA.) 87 cents. The range in Legislative Districts was 57 cents to 94 cents. This data confirms that pay equality will continue to be prioritized.

ERA – December 2023 marked the 100th anniversary of the Equal Rights Amendment being introduced into Congress. There have been no new legislative updates on this topic in the recent months and AAUW stresses that advocating for gender equity includes electing policymakers who support gender equity. AAUW national is putting together a 2024 Voter Education Toolkit.

Book Bans: A recent AAUW event sponsored by the Highline Branch discussed book banning and stressed the importance of understanding the needs of children. Dr. Brandon-Felder, a key speaker made a point that readers need to read stories about themselves. If a child does not read something that relates to their lived experience, the child feels ignored. Children also need to read about others' experiences so that they can understand their situations.

All agreed that intellectual freedom includes stories that mirror and reflect all persons. They also stressed that "The public cannot censor a book based on viewpoints from seventy years ago under McCarthyism. The vague statement "harmful to minors" is inadequate." Lastly, the American Library Association has a publication called *Read These Banned Books: A Journal and 52 Week Reading Challenge.*




Tech Trek - Anticipation! Mary Chesney

Red Paint, The Ancestral Autobiography of a Coast Salish Punk by Sash tagwseblu LaPointe

"Set against a backdrop of tour vans and the breathtaking beauty of Coast Salish ancestral land and imbued with the universal spirit of punk-an ethos that challenges us to reclaim what's rightfully ours: our histories, our power, our traditions, and our truths-Red Paint is ultimately a story of the ways we learn to heal while fighting for our right to a place to call home."

The Rose Code by Kate Quinn

Joining the elite Bletchley Park codebreaking team during World War II, three women from very different walks of life uncover a spy's dangerous agenda years later against the backdrop of the royal wedding of Elizabeth and Philip. "1940. As England prepares to fight the Nazis, three very different women answer the call to Bletchley Park, where the best minds in Britain train to break German military codes. Osla puts her fluent German to use as a translator of decoded enemy secrets. Mab works the legendary codebreaking machines and looks for a socially advantageous husband. Beth's shyness conceals a brilliant facility with puzzles, and she becomes one of the Park's few female cryptanalysts. 1947. As the royal wedding of Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip whips post-war Britain into a fever, the three women are reunited by a mysterious encrypted letter - the key to which lies buried in the long-ago betrayal that destroyed their friendship and left one of them confined to an asylum" -adapted from jacket.

A Fever in the Heartland by Tim Egan

"A historical thriller by the Pulitzer and National Book Award-winning author that tells the riveting story of the Klan's rise to power in the 1920s, the cunning con man who drove that rise, and the woman who stopped them. The Roaring Twenties--the Jazz Age--has been characterized as a time of Gatsby frivolity. But it was also the height of the uniquely American hate group, the Ku Klux Klan. Their domain was not the old Confederacy, but the Heartland and the West. They hated Blacks, Jews, Catholics and immigrants in equal measure, and took radical steps to keep these people from the American promise. And the man who set in motion their takeover of great swaths of America was a charismatic charlatan named D.C. Stephenson. Stephenson was a magnetic presence whose life story changed with every telling. Within two years of his arrival in Indiana, he'd become the Grand Dragon of the state and the architect of the strategy that brought the group out of the shadows--their message endorsed from the pulpits of local churches, spread at family picnics and town celebrations. Judges, prosecutors, ministers, governors and senators across the country all proudly proclaimed their membership. But at the peak of his influence, it was a seemingly powerless woman--Madge Oberholtzer--who would reveal his secret cruelties, and whose deathbed testimony finally brought the Klan to their knees."
