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### President's Message

As we end Women's History Month and head into Indigenous People's Month, let's celebrate our differences and commonalities. Our branch began with 16 charter members in Arlington, Washington. Those early days saw the branch focusing their yearly themes on education and scholarships awarded. By the 1970's members joined from Camano Island and Stanwood. In the early 1980's the branch changed to the Arlington-Stanwood Branch and in 1995 the branch name evolved into the Stanwood-Camano Branch with members from Arlington still attending.

I recently listened to a Status of Women report from AAUW National. The history of our organization on who can, and could be members, has evolved over the years. From first requiring advanced degrees, to adapting to bachelor degrees, adding the associate and technical degrees, and the possibility of "individuals" as members (men), we continue to change during the times. There was even an honorary membership bestowed on remarkable individuals like Eleanor Roosevelt who worked with AAUW on many issues, but didn't have a degree. President George H.W. Bush, as a member, spoke at the 1989 convention, joking that he was the first AAUW member to become President (and hopefully not the last)! It won't be long and we will be voting on whether we will accept individuals without degrees as long as they share our purposes of equity and education for women and girls.

I want to thank the members of the Nominations Committee who will be busy this month filling the open positions on our slate of officers. Joanne Drewson, Martha Huyler and Mary Raymond will be contacting you to fill these positions: President-Elect, VP of Programs, VP of Membership, and VP of Finance-Elect. Officers continuing to serve: President Jackie-Lyn Olson, Secretary Linda Lynn, and VP of Finance Robin Hanks. I hope you will consider answering the call and serve our amazing branch.

Finally, continuing to make local history, we'll be celebrating with our sixth biennial Purses with Purpose Benefit Luncheon and Auction on April 27 to fund scholarships and Tech Trek campers! I applaud all those who are working to make this a successful event full of fun and purpose--equity and education for women and girls!

### Public Policy: Two Big Wins Anne Milton

The 2024 WA Legislative Session was a short session, only 60 days, starting on January 8 and ending on March 7. There were several wins and several losses. AAUW prioritized and tracked 8 bills in 4 areas, namely Education, Healthcare, AI and Economic Security. (See PDF attachment specifying the bills that passed or failed.)



Two big wins were for equal pay and opportunity. Senate Bill SB 5424 will give women more opportunities in the law enforcement workspace allowing for more flexibility in hours, shifts and part-time opportunities. SB 5793 was the second win which expands the definition of family for paid sick leave. Support for paid leave is considered key to closing the gender pay gap for women, especially moms. Closing the gender pay gap will continue to be a legislative focus by AAUW in Washington. In fact, AAUW WA just reported that women still make less than men - 82 cents for every dollar earned by men. The pay gap varies by occupation, legislative district and ethnicity. The pay gap is worse for women of color and for moms. Over the next few months the policy team will be discussing *why* the differences and what changes are truly needed to close the pay gap.

One big surprise that emerged this legislative session was the passage of Initiative 2081 named the Parental Rights Initiative. This will codify a parent's bill of rights on matters ranging from reviewing textbooks and curriculum to obtaining student records, including disciplinary and health information, to being able to opt their child out of sex education. The measure would require that parents receive written notice and option to opt their child out of surveys, activities or questionnaires that question religion, political affiliation, sexual orientation, etc. Both the house and senate passed it. Initiatives do not require governor's signature and therefore I2081 will take effect in 90 days. Stay tuned.

Now that spring is here, legislative advocacy will turn to election advocacy. The first step is identifying what resources are available. The AAUW Action Fund produces voter guides that provide non-partisan information about candidates positions on issues like equal pay, reproductive rights and education. Candidates' positions on the issues are determined using their legislative records, public statements and position papers. This key resource will be updated on the AAUW websites as this election year unfolds.

Please contact Marianne McGarry-Bloom if you are interested in joining our committee. We will meet one afternoon in May, time and date to be determined, to select our winners.







### April Showers Bring May Flowers: A History

Author, Michelle Yastremsky, Petal Talk, 1800Flowers

Once April 1st comes around, it's time to take out of storage those rain boots, umbrellas, ponchos and of course – vases for your spring flowers. The age-old saying "April Showers Bring May Flowers" still holds true today. But just how did this fun saying originate? Today we're diving into the history of this poem and prepping for the rainy months ahead of us!



The poem as we know it today originated in 1157, in the form of a short poem written by Thomas Tusser. The poem can be found in the April section of a collection of his writings titled, "A Hundred Good Points of Husbandry." The poem goes as follows:

Sweet April showers Do spring May flowers

While this poem is clearly a direct ancestor to the version we know today, let's travel back in time a bit further to the end of the Fourteenth Century, where legendary poet Geoffrey Chaucer had his own say on the month of April in his famous collection of stories titled, "The Canterbury Tales." Chaucer's version goes as follows:

### **Original:**

"Whan that Aprill, with his shoures soote The droghte of March hath perced to the roote And bathed every veyne in swich licour, Of which vertu engendred is the flour;"

#### **Translation:**

"When in April the sweet showers fall That pierce March's drought to the root and all And bathed every vein in liquor that has power To generate therein and sire the flower;"

While Chaucer speaks of April in relation to March rather than May, it could certainly be said that while Thomas Tusser may be the father of this saying, Geoffrey Chaucer is certainly the grandfather.

### General Meeting Minutes - March 14, 2024

Program: Debbie Dimitre performed Bertha Knight Landes, first woman mayor of Seattle 1926-28. Location was Utsalady Ladies Aid Building.

**Welcome**: Helen Smith called the meeting to order and read the Land Acknowledgement statement at approximately 1:15 p.m. after an excellent program featuring Debbie Dimitre. Debbie portrayed Bertha Landis, the first woman mayor of Seattle.

**Sunshine Report**: Gay Campbell's husband, Oren, is in a rehab center in Seattle. May Palmer is doing well and has started physical therapy.

**February General Meeting Minutes**: Martha moved to approve the minutes and Kaye Sodt seconded; the motion carried.

**Finance Report**: Robin Hanks reported. She set up a line item on the balance sheet so that the membership can see the balance of the Dues Assistance Fund, which now totals \$384.00. In February she paid Debbie Dimitre \$275 for her performance at our March meeting. This came out of the Branch Programs budget. A total of \$3,881.95 was received for 90 tickets (\$4050-\$168.05 for Credit Card fees.) in February. We bought some purses for \$141 and received a \$50 donation to the PWP fundraiser.

**PWP 2024**: Georgi Proulx reported that 117 out of 144 tickets have been sold. We have over 400 purses and accessories and will make a final look through during set up Friday, April 26. Anne Milton has finished writing descriptions of the purses in the live auction. Jo English has donated 2 separate weeks in Hawaii for the raffles – one week in January 2025, and the other in March 2025. Lynda Buehring is in charge of silent auction setup and may need more volunteers to help set up.

**Membership**: In April new members can save \$36 under the "Shape the Future" program if they join at the general meeting.

**Nominating Committee**: Helen Smith reported a third member is needed for the committee. We have several positions that need to be filled for the next season, including President-Elect, VP of Programs, VP of Membership, Finance-Elect, and Public Policy.

**Programs**: Rose Olson reported next month's meeting is public and will feature community women politicians. Helen Price Johnson, Janet St. Clair, Barb Tolbert, Karla Jacks, and Mary Margaret Haugen will be available to answer questions about women running for public office. The meeting will be April 11 in the Camano Library and will be advertised in the Crab Cracker. The annual High School STEM Scholars Recognition will be the evening of May 9, and in June we will have the Scholarship Tea, which will be held on June 23 at the Camano City Schoolhouse.

**Public Policy**: Anne Milton shared this year's legislature did not pass the "Keep the Care Act", which was disappointing. A law passed to ban book bans, and another law was passed that will allow parents to have the right to control curriculum, which was unexpected and occurred at the last minute. A task force was formed to address A.I. The ERA still didn't pass; several other AAUW causes didn't make it, including the School Library Technology Program.

**Scholarships**: Marianne McGarry-Bloom asked us to please help encourage potential candidates who are in a Master's program or are juniors or seniors in college to apply. She has a video of the 3 recipients from last year. This year scholarships have been opened up to the La Conner area too. The deadline to apply is April 30, and applications can be found at www.aauwsc.org/scholarship.

**Tech Trek**: The price per girl is \$1600. There are eight applicants, and interviews are taking place.
