AAUW Funds: Fulfilling April's Promise Jackie DeFazio

"April is a promise that May is bound to keep," said Hal Borland, American writer, journalist and naturalist—a thought that struck me as particularly appropriate for our branch as we reflect on the success of *PWP 2024* and look forward to using the funds raised in April to support local scholarships, Tech Trek camperships, and national AAUW programs like the American Fellowship Fund.



In May and June, we'll have opportunities to meet in person the young women and girls who will be receiving this year's camperships and scholarships, an experience that always reminds me of the importance of all the work that goes into raising those funds. Less obvious to us may be the results of the funds we contribute to AAUW at the national level.

The American Fellowship Fund is AAUW's largest fellowship program and the oldest non-institutional source of graduate funding for women in the United States. Awards support women scholars who are pursuing full-time study to complete dissertations, conducting postdoctoral research full time, or preparing research for publication for eight consecutive weeks. Here are just three of the women who have received AAUW American Fellowships over the years:

Rachel Hoffstadt, 1929-30 AAUW American Fellow, a professor of microbiology at the University of Washington Medical School and a bacteriologist who helped develop an oral vaccine for typhoid, which was essential in eliminating the disease as a major cause of death.

Hanna Holborn Gray, 1954-55 AAUW American Fellow, the first female president of a major university. She led the University of Chicago from 1978-1993. A recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian award, Gray remains one of the nation's most respected academic leaders and trailblazers in higher education.

Judith Resnik, 1975-76 AAUW American Fellow, the second American woman in space and a crew member of the ill-fated Challenger space shuttle. She was also an electrical engineer, software engineer, biomedical engineer, and pilot.

Public Policy: Election Advocacy Anne Milton

In the previous month's article on public policy, I concluded that AAUW is transitioning from legislative advocacy to election advocacy in its priorities, focus and campaigning energies. Being nonpartisan, AAUW cannot endorse candidates but can endorse bills, referendums and initiatives. AAUW-WA is now opposed to 3 initiatives that emerged in the last legislative session and they will appear



on the Washington ballot in November for approval or rejection. This article will summarize these three initiatives. The policy team is focusing on these due to the concern for the health of our state, education funding and climate priorities.

I-2124: Today with the WA Cares Program, Washingtonians have an affordable guaranteed benefit to help cover the costs of long-term care. These services include home care aide, wheelchairs and equipment, home modifications and residential care. We know that these long-term expenses are not covered by traditional health insurance or Medicare, and for most people Social Security isn't enough to cover this expense. I-2124 will take away \$8 billion from WA Cares, leaving people at the mercy of for-profit insurance companies. Millions will lose their long-term care benefits-and have to pay out of pocket for care or drain their savings to qualify for Medicaid. (Vote NO on I-2124 – "Don't take away our long-term benefits".)

I-2109: this initiative would repeal the modest 7% capital gains tax, giving a tax break to about 4,000 of Washington's mega millionaires and billionaires. If passed, it would cut more than \$5 billion over 6 years from our education, childcare and early learning arenas. Consequently, it would put more pressure on the rest of us to make up the difference through property and sales taxes. (**Vote NO on I-2109 which repeals the Capital Gain Tax.**)

I-2117: The Climate Commitment Act (CCA) would be repealed and this was signed into law in 2021. In it's first year of operation, the CCA generated more than \$2 billion in projects for safer and more efficient transportation, clean energy transitions and support for communities to adapt to the climate crisis. (**Vote NO on I-2127 to preserve climate investments and reduce air pollution.**)

Over the next few months, there will be several opportunities through the AAUW WA website and email updates to learn of next steps and necessary actions to ensure that Washington voters 'vote NO' on all three initiatives. Stay tuned.





"The latest historical novel from New York Times bestselling author Lisa See, inspired by the true story of a woman physician from 15th-century China. According to Confucius, "an educated woman is a worthless woman," but Tan Yunxian—born into an elite family, yet haunted by death, separations, and loneliness—is being raised by her grandparents to be of use. 

General Meeting Minutes - April 11, 2024

The meeting was held at the Camano Island Library, and the program was "Women in Politics Forum", a panel discussion moderated by Janet St Clair. Panel members were Helen Price Johnson, Barb Tolbert, Mary Margaret Haugen, and Karla Jacks.

Call to Order: Helen Smith called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m., announced the raffle to benefit the Dues Assistance program, and told us that Arlington started their AAUW group in April of 1936. Rose Olson introduced the program. Following the program, Helen urged us all to vote in the AAUW National election. For those who did not get the email about voting, Katie Farrey has a contact who can help.

Diversity Statement: Katie Farrey read the land acknowledgement statement.

Sunshine Report: Mary Raymond reported that May Palmer is doing better; she is walking well with a walker and is getting physical therapy at Josephine's. May's husband is home from his stay at Josephine's.

Secretary: A motion to approve the March minutes was made by Joyce Leak and seconded by Kaye Sodt; the motion was approved.

Treasurer: Robin Hanks reviewed the financial reports for March. In March we paid \$50 for use of the Utsalady Ladies Aid building, and \$1000 for the balance of the facility rental for Camano Center. On March 25, a check for \$9600 was sent to AAUW Special Projects Fund to cover six students for Tech Trek. We received deposits from Greater Giving for 39 tickets in March for a total of \$1635.48, a donation to PWP from Jackie-Lyn Olson, and an anonymous donation of \$1,734 for Tech Trek.

PWP: Georgi Proulx reported. Nine tickets remain to be sold. Guests should be encouraged to pre-enter their credit cards to expedite purchases. 98 attendees have made their lunch choice; 37 still need to. Two raffles will be held to win Hawaii trips, courtesy of Jo English. Raffle tickets will be \$10. A Fund to Scholar solicitation will be made during dessert. On Friday, April 26, volunteers will help with setup at the Camano Center starting at 4:00, for about two hours.

Membership: Joanne Drewsen reported that longtime members have a renewal date the end of June. Today's raffle earned \$140 towards the Dues Assistance Fund.

Nominating Committee: The committee is still talking to possible candidates.

Programs: The May meeting will be the annual High School STEM Scholar Recognition, to be held at the Stanwood United Methodist church on Thursday, May 9 at 7:00 p.m. We need volunteers to bring snacks and to help set up at 5:30 p.m.

Scholarships: Marianne McGarry-Bloom has been advertising in the Crab Cracker and other local papers to encourage applicants for our \$10,000 scholarships.

High School STEM Scholars: We are waiting for one school to identify scholars; Stanwood High School has named five.

Interest Groups: Book Group (Empress of the Nile) at Georgi Proulx's at 2:00 p.m. on May 6, the Java Break will be at 10:00 a.m. at the Cookie Mill: Wednesday, May 15, 10:00 a.m.

Candidate Forum: We need someone to lead this important event. Elaine Richardson usually does it and will be unavailable in October.

Announcements: Katie Farrey reported that an important school board meeting would occur on Tuesday, April 16.

Adjourn: Helen Smith adjourned the meeting at 3:00 p.m.
