Public Policy: Update Summary Anne Milton

The November election is around the corner and AAUW is diligently preparing guides, fact sheets, voting records, support letters, etc. Politicians and policy makers routinely make decisions about issues that directly affect women and families, including our paychecks, access to reproductive health care and education funding. To create real change, women must assert their voices and the most powerful place to chime in is at the polls.



Title IX: An incredible example of how your voices and input can change legislation is with the new **Title IX rules**. They are a major win for students. The changes are designed to empower students and educators to better understand and prevent sex-based discrimination and harassment, provide confidential reporting and support options, and improve reporting and resources. The updated laws go into effect on August 1. Why are these changes important? The cost of reporting sexual violence in schools has hurt the students tremendously. Nearly 40% of survivors who report to their school will be pushed out of education. 10% will drop out of school and 70% of survivors who report say the process jeopardized their safety and privacy. Additionally, 15% of survivors are punished or threatened with punishment by their school for reporting.

It has been found that most of the harassment students experience occurs off campus and the new rules will address harassment that occurs off school grounds as well. Schools can no longer respond with deliberate indifference to student reports. They must take prompt and effective action, provide supportive measures, accommodations and resources. Changes have been updated in the investigation aspects so that students do not experience reliving the trauma when dealing with school officials. In the area of pregnancy protections, the Title IX updates ensure that students must be informed of their rights to accommodations like bathroom breaks, desks that fit, lactation areas that are safe, clean and not bathrooms. Athletics was not proposed in the 2022 rulings. AAUW has submitted comments to the Department of Education requesting to swiftly release a Title IX athletics' rule that affirms the right of all students, including transgender, non-binary and intersex students to participate in sports as part of their education.

Ballot Initiatives: The AAUW-WA policy team believe that one of the ballot initiatives (I-2124) has been referred to as a tax issue but is truly a healthcare and long term care insurance need. Essentially, many people think they are already paying for long term care insurance through the Medicare payroll tax. Medicare does not cover long term or supportive care. The 'WA Cares' Program is a social Washington state program that is used more by women due to their longevity and role as caregivers and is at risk. AAUW-WA and forty other advocacy groups are recommending a NO on 'I-2124' this November and are recommending to National that long term care be added to public policy priorities.


Legislation: The protection of reproductive rights including access to contraceptive care, abortion, sexual health education and family planning services has been an unwavering AAUW policy since 1977. The WHPA (Women's Health Protection Act) would take the principles of Roe vs. Wade and make them federal law. It didn't pass the Senate but public outcry continues for federal legislation on abortion protections. One of the tools provided by AAUW is the 'Congressional Voting Record' funded by the AAUW Action Fund. With this resource, you can learn where your elected officials stand on issues critical to AAUW's mission and write, advocate and vote accordingly.

DEI (Diversity, Equity and Inclusion) Spotlight Katie Farrey

Founded in 1973, PFLAG is the first and largest organization dedicated to supporting, educating, and advocating for LGBTQ+ people and their families.

Definition from PFLAG Skagit:

Ally: A term generally relating to individuals who support marginalized groups. In the LGBTQ+ community, this term is used to describe an individual who is supportive of



LGBTQ+ individuals and the community, either personally or as an advocate. Allies include both heterosexual and cisgender people who advocate for equality in partnership with LGBTQ+ people, as well as people within the LGBTQ+ community who advocate for others in the community. "Ally" is not an identity and allyship is an ongoing process of learning that includes action.

General Meeting Minutes - May 9, 2024

Program: Stanwood High School STEM Scholar Recognition and Introduction of 2024 Tech Trek Campers held at the United Methodist Church in Stanwood at 7:00 p.m.

Call to Order: Helen Smith called the meeting to order at 8:25 p.m. following the program.

Secretary: Helen presented April's general meeting minutes for approval as printed in the April newsletter. Motion to approve was made by Joyce Leak and seconded by Anne Milton; motion approved.

Treasurer: Nancy reviewed the financial reports for April. The Operating Account included branch dues and a raffle that went to the Dues Assistance Program. The Scholarship account had a lot of activity from PWP and an anonymous donation to Tech Trek. Total assets are \$51,402.83.

Membership: Joanne Drewsen reported that we have 3 new members. Membership renewals for existing members are due. The annual cost of \$106 is the same as last year, and renewal can easily be done online. The Dues Assistance Fund is available for those who want help with the fee. Jackie Defazio reminded everyone to vote in the national election: the current voting percentage of members is only 4%.

Programs: Rose Olson thanked everyone for their contributions to the success of the event. The next program will be the Scholarship Tea to be held at 1:00 p.m. on Sunday, June 23 at the Camano City Schoolhouse.

Scholarships: Marianne McGarry-Bloom told us that there were fifteen applications received for the three \$10,000 scholarships being awarded. Since the Scholarship event on June 23 is a tea, she suggests that "teasized" refreshments be brought. Marianne will be having a screening meeting at her house to screen the applications.

PWP: Georgi Proulx led a very successful event this year. Gross receipts from auctions and donations totaled nearly \$65,000. After expenses she estimated our net funds will be about \$53,000. The steering committee will meet the week of May 21 to review the processes, pros and cons, with recommendations for 2026. Georgi is currently selling the twice-used wine glasses purchased in 2013 for \$10 per box. Contact her to arrange your purchase of 1 box or more. Cash or checks should be payable to AAUW-SC and will be deposited in the scholarship account.

Tech Trek: Mary Chesney, the Tech Trek coordinator, said that ten girls were nominated this year. Eight of them applied and went through the interview process, resulting in six being selected. Mary is now on the state committee, and she is always looking for new people to help screen the candidates.

STEM Scholars: STEM Scholars from Arlington and Stanwood High Schools were presented at tonight's general meeting. Lakewood was honored but did not attend.
